W4IWW SILENT KEY

It is with great sadness that we mark the passing of Gene Bossieux, W4IWW, on November 8, 1995 at the age of 88. He held an FCC Extra Class Amateur Radio license and a First Class Commercial Radio broadcast license. Gene was one of the charter members of the Albemarle Amateur Radio Club and was the trustee from 1962 until 1986. Gene was also active in the Charlottesville/Waynesboro club which preceded the formation of the AARC. He encouraged the association of the AARC with Civil Defense and was instrumental in arranging for the use of the fall-out shelter in the City Court House as our original club room. He designed and installed the antenna installation at the Court House. Gene was an active participant in the annual ARRL Field Day exercises and maintained much of the Radio Club's equipment for many years. He was active in VHF/UHF activities and was a consultant for many of the early repeater activities including the initial efforts on a 220 MHz repeater. Gene was the Chief Engineer for WINA and, after "retirement", for WJMA in Orange. He worked in radio communications for the Richmond Police before coming to Charlottesville. A few years ago Gene moved to Williamsburg to be nearer to his family but maintained his membership in the AARC. He was elected a Life Member of the Albemarle Amateur Radio Club in 1994.

The results are in and it seems that the November Turkey Hunt was a success. We had 3 Teams and one Single Hunter. We located this one at the Riverheads High School about 7-8 miles west of Stuart's Draft. Transmitter 2 was a packet TNC operating on 5 watts transmitting a short beacon every 10 seconds. This one was located on the side of the road on Rte 42 about 30 feet from the Rockingham County line...one of the northernmost points in Augusta County. Transmitter 3 was a mobile transmitter operating between the towns of Piedmont and Barrenridge with the transmitter operating ONLY when it was in town and never while in transit. The day was beautiful although a bit cool. The Team of N4PGS and WA4MHP. running a nifty Doppler array, claimed 1st place in the Team category with a total time of 3 hours 29 minutes and a score of 404 points. KN4KB and KB4CNI came in next (also running a Doppler array) with a time of 3 hours 48 minutes and a score of 572. Year-End Overview Ron Richey, K4RKA

The Albemarle Amateur Radio Club, WA4TFZ, operates four voice repeaters, two on two meters, one on 220 MHz, and one on 440 MHz, a packet node, and a PBBS on two meters.

The .925 Machine

Thanks to the efforts of Hein Hvatum (N4FWA), the 146.925 repeater has found a permanent location on top of Martha Jefferson Hospital in downtown Charlottesville. While not as high as the previous location on Observatory Mountain, the site provides several benefits; emergency power from the hospital backup system, ability to use a bigger and higher gain antenna, and good coverage of the city of Charlottesville which is the primary objective for this repeater. With the antenna and the basic repeater improvements, the overall coverage has decreased only slightly to the north and actually improved to the south.

Coverage Improvements

Coverage of the city proper is now possible with a handheld from almost all locations. The new equipment allows the use of 88.5 Hz sub-audible tone squelch when interference causes continuous keying problems. This has seldom been necessary and the repeater is on carrier access 90% of the time. Credit also goes to Joe Fritz (KD4RWX), Gerald Nauman (KN4FM), Rich Bradley (WB3DZC), Tom Lachendro (AD4AD), and the chairman of the AARC Technical Committee, Mike Duvall (AC4ZQ), for getting this machine up and running in its new location. The other repeaters have also had various improvements.

The 16/76 Machine

An amateur can use touch tone 911* on the 146.76 machine to report an emergency situation. Touch tone 0* will close the patch. The 911 center has been trained to accept reports from hams and many calls have been successfully made in the last year. This repeater also has the capability of operating with 88.5 Hz subaudible tone when necessary. When the tone access has been enabled by the control operator, it may be temporarily turned off by a user on the 146.16 MHz input frequency by touch tone 325*, allowing normal carrier access. The repeater will revert to tone access after 1 minute of no carrier or by touch tone 326*. The operation of the packet node

on Carters Mountain has also been improved. Contributors to these efforts including site maintenance include (in addition to those mentioned above) Sam Gentry (N4WJQ), Bud Beazell (KB4JNI), LeRoy Sutter (WA4MHP), Pete Taylor (KC4UCK), Brian Fox (KE4HIA), Rick Berman (KO4WQ), Bob Stannard (N6AAR), Bob Pattison (KM4DU), Pete Wildman (AD4TU), Harry Dannals (W2HD), and Greg Faust (N4PGS). Apologies to anyone who was missed-your efforts are appreciated also. This is a BIG improvement from several years ago when only about 3 of us struggled to keep fewer and less capable repeaters on the air.

Local Nets

There are two regular nets on the .76 repeater; the Monday night Info Net at 7 PM with net control Marc Rowley (N4TZE), and the Thursday night Northern Piedmont (ARES) Emergency Net at 8 PM with net control Morris Jones (NM4R). The Thursday night net is usually followed with the AARC On-The-Air-Swapfest and Technical Session chaired by Ron Richey (K4RKA), and Joe Giovanelli (W2PVY), respectively. Others who fill in as net control when needed include Harry Dannals (W2HD), and LeRoy Sutter (WA4MHP). Anyone in the area or passing through is invited to join either of these nets.

Emergency Communications

Hein Hvatum (N4FWA), organized several practice emergency and public service events. The AARC/ARES group also participated in a couple of real emergencies including the Madison county flood in June. A number of capable people including Sam Gentry (N4WJQ), have proven their ability to respond on very short notice. Our net training and practice exercises have really paid off when the real thing occurs. The traditional ARRL Field Day emergency exercise was well organized by Bob Pattison (KM4DU) and Ernie Sardi (W2EIU).

The AARC also publishes a monthly newsletter and a yearly directory of Radio Amateurs in the Albemarle county area. Thanks to Joe Fritz (KD4RWX), and Mike Johnson (KD4NNL), for their efforts. We are expecting equally fine output from our new newsletter editors Paul Dean (WB9HGZ), and Eileen Dean (WD9EIA).


