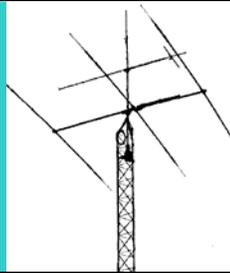

The President's Letter

Greetings to the Albemarle Amateur Radio Club from ARS K4DND. I thought we were finished with Public Service Events for the year. I knew I was wrong as soon as I got a call from the race director for the **Great Eastern Endurance Run, scheduled for September 27.** Those participating included Jeffrey N4LFJ, Elmer KF4UCI, Elmer's daughter Sara and son Jonathan, Dave Tanks AD4TJ and Darrell Little K14LLA, and myself.

Dave and Darrell are from the Valley ARA and took over to let Jeffrey get an early out. Sara and Jon were a great help to the organizers and I really appreciate their participation. This event (running long distances in the mountains) is for the people who are seriously committed, or perhaps they are just people in serious need of commitment. I haven't decided which yet. There were approximately 54 runners doing a half marathon which is a little over 13 miles. 83 runners were signed up to run 50K which is 31 miles and 41 runners for the 100K or 62 miles. These people are seriously crazy. 50K and 100K runners started out at 6AM in the dark. The half marathon runners started out at 7AM and were all finished in 4.5 hours. The 50K runners were finished in 10.5 hours and the last 100K runner crossed the finish line in 19.25 hours. That put the final runner over the finish line at 1:25 AM the next morning. **Did I mention anywhere that these people are really crazy?** They started out in the dark, and for many runners, spent hours in the evening and night running through the mountains on dirt roads, jeep trails, single track trails and the parkway. Quite a few

arrived at the finish line battered and scraped from falling on the trail.

Race organizers were very happy with the amateur radio support; I fully expect that we will be called on next year to give a repeat performance. Again, my thanks to the stations that participated in this unusual event. Are we finished with Public Service now? Nope, Jay K4AZV and Steph K4BMM are heading up the **American History Weekend October 4-5** at the Albemarle County Office Building.

AARC Board Minutes - September 10, 2008

The September 2008 AARC monthly meeting was convened at 7:30PM by Dave Damon (K4DND), club President, at the NRAO building in Charlottesville, VA.

Dave introduced Alan Swinger (K9MBO) who gave a presentation provided by the June/July DXpedition team that put Sable Island on the air as CY0X. This expedition was noteworthy in that its focus was 6M and 2M operation, with HF as secondary. Also, Jeffrey Seay (N4LFJ, Club PIO), showed members recent videos about AARC and Ham Radio that have aired and are airing on local TV stations. Well done to both members for these informative presentations.

Regular Meeting - September 10, 2008

The General meeting commenced with Dave K4DND addressing the following:

- The minutes of the July 2008 meetings were approved as they appear in the September issue of the Beacon without discussion or change. All members' present made brief introductions, and three life members were present – Harry (W2HD), Ron (K4RKA) and Joe (W2PVY). Note that there was no General Membership meeting in August since the club picnic was held on the regular meeting date.
- Don (K4UVA) presented the club Treasurer's report indicating a 31 Aug balance on hand of \$2998.29.
- Mike (KI4RIX), VP, noted that there will be no presentations at the Oct meeting in view of club elections. Those members interested in running for

office should contact Mike (mjb8h@virginia.edu). November meeting presentations will be on GPS and HF Digital modes.

Dave's President's report included the following:

- The Club Picnic, held on 12 Aug, was a great success. Thanks to John (KI4DJT) for his usual BBQ expertise and to all who brought food.
- Dave noted that club membership was at 96. Dennis WR4I rejoined at the meeting, raising that to 97.
- The Special Service Club application was approved by the ARRL and a Certificate received, so AARC is now official. **K4DND reported that the AARC has been an ARRL affiliated club since 1965 (43 years) and held Special Service Club status since 1991 (17 years).**
- A letter of appreciation was received from the Blue Ridge Extreme bike-athon co-directors for AARC member support. A check for \$550 also accompanied the letter and was turned over to the Treasurer. Thanks to all. Dave passed out certificates of recognition to participants present.
- Club insurance – coverage and cost – was discussed. Pinning down specifics has been difficult, but the reasonable approach appears to be for AARC to maintain liability insurance to cover member/club activities and to self-insure equipment damage. In so doing, coverage will be adequate and price reasonable (\$488/yr). A motion was made to take this approach and approved by the members present.
- Club Nametags were proposed as a possible AARC recognition item for members. Members present generally expressed interest so Dave will investigate sources and cost, and will report back at a future meeting.

Committee reports are as follows:

Activities – Dave (K4DND) on behalf of Jay (K4AZV) :

Presented Certificates to members who participated in the Airport Exercise

Mentioned the upcoming **Military History weekend** scheduled for October 4-5. Contact Jay (K4AZV) – k4azv@turing.org - for details and to volunteer.

Fund Raising – Linda (KI5LLB) proposed the potential purchase of T-Shirts with club/callsign emblems as both club recognition and fund raising items. Club members indicated interest and Linda will come back at the next meeting with alternative sources and costs for member consideration. Those interested should bring a check so these can be ordered.

Technical – Gordon (WW4GW) presented the following September Technical Committee report: Over the past two months the technical committee has performed some repairs to a couple of the club's repeaters. The **146.925 repeater** on Heards Mountain has had a new transistor (FET) installed in the RF amplifier stage. The existing FET has been known to have problems, not only in this particular model repeater, but in other ICOM receivers as well. Knowing this, the decision was made to replace it with a more expensive FET - one that has more gain, a lower noise factor, and built-in transient spike protection diodes. With the new FET the receiver now has a measured sensitivity of .19 microvolts for 12 db SINAD. Factory specs on the receiver are .4 microvolt for 12 db SINAD. There was some antenna grounding concerns at this site and they were also resolved at the same time. The committee also paid a visit to Buck's Elbow, site of the **146.895 repeater**. The new antenna (Hustler G6 – dual band – 6db gain) has been installed along with new 7/8 heliax and jumpers on each end. Since the existing GE receiver had a known sensitivity issue, a temporary repeater was installed courtesy of Elmer – KF4UCI – who loaned one to the club. The GE receiver has been removed from the site and will be repaired and is expected to perform as well as the loaner. This will be reinstalled as soon as the repair is made and the receiver is thoroughly tested to factory specifications. The committee also installed a new digipeater at the Buck's Elbow site courtesy of Greg – N4PGS. This is a packet node that supports both 1200 baud on 2M and 9600 baud on 440. This digipeater also uses the Hustler G6 antenna, but it is not installed as high as the repeater antenna. A new ½ inch Heliac with jumpers was also installed. We still have the new 7/8 heliax and jumpers along with the new controller for the 146.760 site at Marshall Manor and they will be installed as soon as weather permits.

Publications - Jeffrey (N4LFJ) presented the July/August report:

A press release concerning the SkyWarn net control class on July 26 was sent to multiple media outlets in various markets including Charlottesville, Harrisonburg, Lynchburg, Richmond, Staunton, and Waynesboro. Locally, the press release was sent to the Charlottesville NewsPlex (WCAV 19, WVAW 16, and WAHU 27), WVIR 29, the Daily Progress, the Hook, C'Ville Weekly, WCHV 1260, and WINA 1070. This information was also sent to all ARES ECs, DECs, other ARES officials, and amateur radio clubs in the region.

An interview was held at the residence of Harry Dannals, W2HD, on Friday, July 18. This interview was conducted by Dave Maurer of the Daily Progress. Attending the interview were Harry Dannals, W2HD, Dave Damon, K4DND, and Jeffrey Seay, N4LFJ. Topics discussed included emergency and public service, technical changes, and human interest in amateur radio. This article ran in the Tuesday, July 29, edition of the Daily Progress. Also note that the article was the cover story for the paper.

With the assistance of Allen Pitts of the ARRL, **AARC has now begun to air radio and television PSA commercials.** At present, these are being regularly aired on WCAV 19 (CBS), WVAW 16 (ABC), WAHU 27 (Fox), My C'Ville TV, WVIR 29 (NBC), CW29, WQMZ 95.1, WINA 1070, and WVAX 1450. These PSAs have also been sent to a majority of the other radio and television stations, however, no official confirmation has been received as of yet.

The Director of the Publications Committee was given a brochure from the Lynchburg Amateur Radio Club by Gordon Winn, WW4GW. Research will be done to decide what AARC needs to do in order to develop a similar brochure.

A press release was sent out to area media outlets concerning the Charlottesville-Albemarle Regional Airport Drill. This release was not picked up, however, RACES was included in the list of participants that used on WINA 1070.

Information concerning the club's September meeting was sent to area media outlets for use on community calendars. This has been heard on area radio stations including WVTF and WTJU. It is also listed on almost all media outlet websites in the Charlottesville area.

Two press releases received from the ARRL were forwarded to local media outlets just before Tropical Storm Hanna's arrival. **On Tuesday, September 2, Dave Damon, K4DND, received a call from Claire O'Brien of NBC29 (WVIR-TV) who wanted to do a report on amateur radio's preparedness for the storm.** A meeting was scheduled with officials at Martha Jefferson Hospital and Miss O'Brien on the coming Wednesday. The report aired throughout the morning on NBC29 (WVIR-TV). In return for her doing a story on amateur radio, an invitation was extended to attend the September club meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned. The next meeting, including election of officers, will be held on Tuesday, 14 October, at 7:30 PM at NRAO.

Propagation de K7RA

ARRL Propagation Bulletin ARLP041

The latest sunspot appearance reported last week seems to follow the pattern emerging for most of 2008. A spot will appear for one or two days, and then suddenly it is gone.

Last week's Propagation Forecast Bulletin ARLP040 mentioned the solar wind being at an all time low. This week NASA announced that 2008 so far is the "blankest year of the space age," with over 200 spotless days. The minimum following Cycle 18 in 1954 had 241 days without sunspots, and it preceded the solar max in 1959 for Cycle 19, which had the highest sunspot numbers on record.

With September passed, we now can calculate the 3-month average of sunspot numbers centered on August, which was 1.1. Compare that with 3 month averages going back to June 2006.

Randy Crews, W7TJ of Spokane, Washington commented that extended periods of quiet Sun make propagation more predictable, but zero sunspots affects all bands, not just 15 meters and higher frequencies. Even 80 meters is different. After sunset when residual ionization from the Sun is gone, 80 meters suffers. He believes we are seeing a double bottom (October 2007 and now) following the double peak of Cycle 23.

Two weeks ago, on September 19, Michael Reid, WE0H of Saint Francis, Minnesota mentioned his experimental operation on 600 meters (500 KHz) as WD2XSH/16. Mike said the low solar activity and quiet geomagnetic conditions make this part of the spectrum quite attractive for long distance propagation. During the previous week he and other FCC Part 5 experimental stations were beaconing and getting reports from all over, typically 1000 miles distance.

Early last Friday morning (September 26) George Hrischenko, VE3DGX of Zephyr, Ontario noticed a number of UHF and high VHF (175-220 MHz) television stations coming in from a long distance away. He didn't say where the signals were from, but figures it must be from ducting.

In response to last week's mention of noctilucent clouds and UHF propagation, Ken Beck, WI7B of Kennewick, Washington sent a copy of the scientific paper by Bellan referenced in the article in Science Daily, published in the Journal of Geophysical Research, Vol 113, D16215. He notes the article mentions propagation from 50 MHz to 1 GHz, so this may be a useful propagation mode for 6 meters as well.



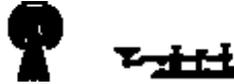
