PUBLIC SERVICE **EVENTS 1992**

Here is a list of 1992 public events known so far (April 13):

SPRINT TRIATHLON CHAMPIONSHIPS -Sunday, May 10, Lake Monticello.

The sprint triathlon consists of a 0.25 km swim, a 12 mile bike race, and a 6 km run. The complete event takes place within the Lake Monticello development. Need 15 stations.

BATESVILLE DAYS 10 km RUN, Batesville. Last time (March 25) I talked to the 10 k run organizer, he didn't know the date. However, it will be on a weekend in May. He said he would call me as soon as he found out, but I haven't heard anything vet (April 13). Number of stations unknown, but probably less than 8. DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIPS BIKE RACE, JA ST

Saturday, May 23 and Sunday, May 24, Boonesville.

Same arrangement as last year. This is a big event which lasts most of Saturday and half o Sunday. We needed 13 stations each day last year.

MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS BIKE TOUR, Saturday, June 13 and Sunday, June 14.

THIS IS THE BIG ONE. The Saturday route is the same as last year's (Charlottesville - 4H camp near Appomattox), but Sunday's route will be different. The tour will end at the Sweet Briar College in Amherst. Last year we manned 30 station's each day. However, they expect the tour to be bigger this year (early registrations run far ahead of last year's), and might need more stations. As before, the Lynchburg group will be responsible for the second day, but any hard core ham from Charlottesville who wants to participate both days is certainly welcome.

BIATHLON, Saturday, August 8, Free Union.

A combination run and bike race. Last time we

provided 8 stations.

LAKE MONTICELLO TRIATHLON, Sunday,

September 27, Lake Monticello
Same as last year. We provided 17 stations.

OTHER.

The Horse Trials might appear again in the fall. No date yet, but I have talked to the organizers and they want us back. I was also told that next year (1993) there will be a giant Horse Trial at Montpelier. "Olympic level operation", they say. Oh well, that's next year.

I guess the First Night Virginia will also be held again on New Years Eve.

PBBS DEVELOPMENTS

Both the WA4TFZ (CHO) and the KB4YQC PBBS's now have the SAM Callbook database in operation. It is now very simple to use the PBBS to look up any U.S. call. Once you log on and get the PBBS prompt (e.g., WA4TFZ>), give the command, CB or Callbook, followed by the call letters of the station you wish to locate, e.g., CB KM4DU. In response, you will receive the following:

KM4DU A ROBERT E. PATTISON POB 6996 CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA 22906 Operation complete

. Like W. struck i burec

You may look up a series of calls at the same time. Just make sure that each call is separated by a space; e.g., Call of the Call is separated by CB KM4DU W6UZ W2HD K4RKA

The callbook database is dated November 1991. It is expected that the database will be updated every six months with the next update due in June.

VIRGINIA PACKET RADIO ASSOCIATION

The Virginia Packet Radio Association (VPRA) has been revived! Newer packeteers (since 1990) are probably unaware that such an organization existed. VPRA was organized in 1986 and was very active until 1989. Since 1989 the packet situation in Virginia has fallen into disarray. There is no coordination of packet frequencies, PBBS forwarding protocol, etc. throughout the state. Prior to 1989 VPRA was very active in achieving node sysops. The organization also supported

needed nodes in various areas. In addition, a regular newsletter kept members informed of packet activities.

Temporary officers and directors of VPRA have been selected to serve on an interim basis until a general election can be held, probably this fall. The next meeting of VPRA is scheduled for the Virginia Beach Hamfest on Saturday, September 19, 1992. In the meantime, newsletters are expected to be issued to those who were members when the organization died and to those who become new members. The original articles of incorporation are still in effect. Packeteers in Virginia are invited to renew their membership or to join if not already a member. Those joining in 1992 will be considered charter members

\$ AARC TREASURER'S REPORT

As of April 15, 1992:

A new schedule of annual membership dues was voted in at the February '92 meeting. Individual dues were increased to \$15/yr, family membership was set at \$20/yr, and younger licensed hams, 16 yrs of age and under, gratis.

With this increase in membership dues structure, our bank balance has increased. As of March 17, 1992, our deposits in the Club Fund were \$1235.78; in the Repeater Fund \$1591.88; and \$304.37 in the Link Fund, for a total of \$3,132,03. The surplus in the Link Fund is ear-marked for additional equipment in the 900 MHz range.

Since the first of this year, contributions to the Repeater Fund have been \$95.00, and to the Packet Fund \$25.00. Additional contributions to the Repeater Fund from Hamfests have amounted to \$236.35. Major expenses from the Club Fund so far this year have been: Meeting announcements, newsletter and postage - \$218.14; Training materials \$161.04; refreshments at meetings - \$28.74; plus incidentals (SERA membership, State Corporation fee, memorial flowers) - \$67.65.

At the present time there are a total of 124 paid-up members, 34 of which are family members, and 2 are under 16 years of age. Our total paid-up membership last year reached 137 in mid-October.


