Ben Hammann, W4UDD, came to Charlottesville to work for Sperry Piedmont Co. in the early 1960's. He had previously worked for the Simpson Instrument Co. and was well qualified to head up the instrument calibration department of this new company which is today Sperry Marine Inc. Unfortunately, Ben had Parkinson's disease which robs people of their motor control. By the time I came to know him, he was barely functioning at work and was soon forced to retire. Some time later, Ben was one of the early volunteers for the experimental drug El Dopa. This treatment was so successful that when I visited him sometime early in 1972 I hardly recognized him. He was able to walk unassisted, though slowly, and was able to hold a microphone well enough again to be interested in getting back into ham radio. The relatively new operation on 2 meter FM seemed just the thing since he and his wife were planning several cross country trips. A 12 channel, 10 watt Swan FM-2X was simple enough to operate that he could manage and I

Ben passed on the that great ham-shack in the sky several years ago and a couple of years ago I was asked by the Settler Sales people to help evaluate the electronics equipment he had. In the process of going through the stuff, I found Ben's original mobile log book. It may be of some interest to know who Ben talked to on the Charlottesville .28//88 repeater in October, 1972. There was Harry, WA4BGM; Tom, WA4UXD; Bill, WA4ZZB; and Ron, K4RKA, who was using the same Swan transceiver that Ben had which Nancy is still using today. Then there was a noisy but understandable contact with Amos. K4WQS, from Danville using a Walkie Talkie - see, the old tube repeater DID have good coverage. He started off 1973 with a contact with Chuck. W4VOL: then Carter. W4GPK: and Dick, W4OFR. The remnants of the Settler's sale were donated to the AARC, and you can still see some items from Ben's ham career in the radio club collection at Richard's barn.

The President's Words of Wisdom Rumble... Pop... Zzzzzt... Crack! BOOM! Sizzle...

These are the sounds of summer, to those who listen to the longer wavelengths and experience the sounds of nature at work. These hot summer nights are sometimes lit up with eerie displays of flashes and pops, just like flash bulbs going off. Beautiful, ves, but dangerous as well, especially to those who make it a practice of sticking sharp metallic objects high in the sky. Why would anyone do THAT? Well, ruling out those of us who are golfers (like ham radio, another form of addiction, but that's another story) it's got to be those crazy ham radio folks. Unfortunately, we have discovered that the best way to receive radio signals is also one of the best ways to receive a piece of nature's bounty, 40,000 volts worth!

Sure enough, summer is here and so is the likelihood of lightning. I've been to a lot of shacks and seen quite a few different ways of dealing with the problem of lightning, ranging from nothing at all to some truly amazing arrestor schemes. What about you? Have you made adequate provision for the possibility of a nearby lightning strike? Not only could it cause damage to your radio equipment, but it could cause some real damage to YOUR equipment, if you know what I mean...

Probably one of the easiest and best ways to prevent damage to your equipment is to unplug your antennas when you are not using your rig. Most of the solid-state radios built today are not especially robust when it comes to withstanding several thousand volts to the antenna terminal. By unplugging your antenna, AND making sure that the antenna cable and connector is well away from any conductive surface, you can live through some pretty severe storms. There are plenty of lightning arrestor (really surge arrestor) devices on the market. They offer varying degrees of protection from the surges accompanying nearby lightning strikes. Also, make sure your rigs and any other electronic device in your shack is grounded.

Speaking of grounds, how well is YOUR shack grounded? Not only does it make for better reception and transmission in some cases, but it's also a very good idea for safety. I'm not talking about a little 12 gauge wire from your HF transceiver wrapped around the nearest cold water pipe, but a real GROUND, At least one ground rod, properly installed, with a large wire (or strap) connecting it to your equipment.

Now, these precautions will help you, your equipment and your QTH survive a nearby lightning strike, which is the most probable type of event you will encounter. Unfortunately, there isn't much you can do to prevent damage from a direct lightning strike. You can, however, minimize the possibility of direct strikes by locating your antenna near taller, grounded objects, but that's not always guaranteed to work.

Ah well, if you want guarantees, buy a toaster.

So play it safe, and unplug those antennas! It looks like a LONG summer. Greg (N4PGS)


