TECHNICAL COMMITTEE REPORT:**76 repeater**

I have an update on the 146.76 repeater for all those that have not come to the meetings lately. The 146.76 repeater seems to be working fine in its new home. We have had many good reports from people down in Louisa and north of Charlottesville. We have good coverage down 64 towards Zion's cross roads. Coverage is about as good down Interstate 64 as it was with the gremlin. Coverage west on 64 gets somewhat spotty in a couple places even with 50 watts.

We have basically finished the installation of the tower, feedline and grounding system, many thanks to KF4FYI, K4JMY and KF4UCI all the others for taking care of the digging, concrete work and erecting of the tower. The only thing left is to connect the batteries and make sure we get an alarm when the power fails. This will be completed by the September 11th drill at the airport.

Those of you that have used the repeater in the past few weeks may have noticed that the audio levels have been changing and there has been a strange buzzing in the audio. Please do not try to adjust your rigs..

KF4UCI, K4JMY and myself have been working on getting the CTCSS output tone working. We have been changing things to try to get rid of some distortion in tone. Unfortunately, what we hear on the mountain when testing is not what we hear when other people get on the air. We still have some distortion but we are working on that. We reached a point where we have had to compromise the output level of the CTCSS tone to keep the distortion in the audio down. The output tone may work on some rigs but not on others. Please let KF4UCI or myself know if it works on your rigs or not. For those that may not know about CTCSS, the output tone on the repeater allows the CTCSS decoders in some rigs to eliminate noise from skip, pagers or computers. Only signals with the correct tone (88.5 in this case) will open the receivers squelch.

I would like to thank the following people at this time for their efforts to make this happen. DON, KE4DDR; Jimmy, K4JMY; Grayson, KF4FYI; Dave, K4DND; Bob, K4DU; Harry, W2HD; Ron, K4RKA and Mike, N4HRO. These people have provided very valuable help in the last few months. If I forgot anyone I apologize. Please let me know.

220 repeater

The 220 repeater seems to be working fine from the reports I get. K4DU and I are working on building replacements for the 220 cans that were crushed when the tree fell on the Carter's Mountain shack. I have managed to scrounge some 3 inch copper pipe, so all we need is some free time and labor. By mid September we might have one ready to bring for a short show-and-tell at one of the club meetings.

440 repeater.

The 440 repeater seems to be doing well. The coverage is not that great out at my end of town but it seems to do extremely well on the west and northwest end of the county. I used a hand held with a rubber duck at a gas station on the south side of Stanton to talk to WOANN. Ann was in Churchville. Eventually, the 440 repeater's antenna will be put up a little higher. That should help the coverage east of town some.

Phone Patch

At the October meeting I am going to give a talk about options for a repeater phone patch. Since we lost access to Carter's Mountain and have Piney Mountain on line, now is a good time to bring up adding an autopatch to one of the repeaters. Several people have told me that the 911 phone patch is not as important as it once was because of cell phones. Others indicate that they have used the autopatch and like having it around when they are out late at night. There might not be someone with a cell phone around to come to the rescue they say. There is the recurring expense that we have been unable to get waived. This eats up a large percentage of the dues you pay. We also need a control link to program the 76 controllers. Now is your chance to speak out. I am not trying to take sides. I just want the people that pay the dues to help make this decision. If the club wants it, we can get some people working on making it happen. There are several options and things to consider so please come to the meeting with an open mind.

DO WE PLAN AND FOLLOW THOSE PLANS?

Joe, KD4RWX

In this and recent newsletters, various concerns about the club and the way it functions have been expressed. Other comments have been noted, by this writer, in general conversations and discussions regarding the issues.

It is my wish to list a few of these concerns and to propose some steps which might be taken which might cause some corrective actions to be taken. The hope is to have a more dynamic and satisfying experience for club members.

Some Concerns:

Leadership-

Leadership is a tough one. I searched the Internet recently for leadership models and there were many ideas. Most were from the business world and were good reading. However, they would require two newsletters just to present the articles and they were just the "tip of the iceberg," so to speak.

In the article, "Self-Assessment: The First Action Requirement of Leadership" from the Peter F. Drucker Foundation, mention is made of "a method designed to help organizations think through: what we are doing, why we are doing it, and what we *must* do." The Drucker organization also developed the "Self-Assessment Tool," which presents the five most important questions for a non-profit organization to ask: *What is our mission? Who is our customer? What does the customer value? What are our results? What is our plan?*

Good questions. The answers to these, I would suggest, very few, if any, of our membership knows. Are answers to any of the five questions written down? Yes, at least one!

WHAT IS OUR MISSION?

Has anyone read it recently? Probably not. It can be read in its entirety on the AARC web site. It is the Charter under which we operate as a Corporation in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Let's take a look at a portion of it.

**RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
OF
ALBEMARLE AMATEUR RADIO CLUB, INC.**

We, the undersigned Officers and Directors, hereby restate the articles of the non-stock corporation formed under the provisions of Chapter 10 of Title 13.1 of the Code of Virginia on June 10, 1970, and to that end set forth as follows:

FIRST: *The name of the corporation is to be ALBEMARLE AMATEUR RADIO CLUB, INC.*

SECOND: *The purposes for which the corporation is organized is as follows:*

(1) The primary purposes are to operate a non-stock corporation for educational and scientific purposes as follows:

(a) To educate and increase the proficiency of its members in the science of radio communication.

(b) To provide for dissemination of information among its members concerning scientific advancement and progress in the field of radio communication.

(c) To organize and train units of licensed radio amateurs capable of maintaining radio communication as a public service during periods of emergency.

(d) To encourage and sponsor experimental activities in radio communications and electronics, to the end that skills and experience gained in amateur radio will further the application of electronics to the benefit of the public at large.

(e) To pursue such other related educational and charitable purposes as are permitted by Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended.

These are essentially the purposes of Amateur Radio.

I will not attempt to answer "How are we doing?" on each of these purposes, but it can easily be seen that in some areas we are doing pretty good. For instance in Section (c). This has been a major function of the Club. Could improvements be made in this purpose, if we were to consider the questions: What is our plan? and What are our results? I suggest that we might still have a little work to do. For instance, what if Greg and Hein suddenly moved to Arizona? Do we have a written plan? Do we have any knowledge of past results to guide us?

What about *(a) To educate and increase the proficiency of its members in the science of radio communication?* What is our plan? What are our results? Do we have any part of our membership focusing on this purpose. The Education Committee would seem to be the likely group. Does the Education Committee have a written plan? If they don't, how do they know what to do? How many persons actually serve on this committee? How often do they meet?

If you look carefully at the purpose you will see that this is NOT speaking to the issue of conducting classes for new Hams. This is about our own membership. I would suggest that it means that the knowledgeable teach/educate other members who are less knowledgeable in such areas as the content associated with General, Advanced, and Extra Class courses regardless of any interest in learning fast code or upgrading to a higher license class. There may be other areas which members might like to learn about the ideas.

It would follow that from our membership we should have individuals who "joyfully" step forward to assist in the process of teaching. Do we? No very many, especially in the last 3 years.

What about the Novice/Tech class? I would suggest it is derived from the last section. Section *(e) To pursue such other related educational ...*

The Novice/Tech class fits nicely here. This would also fall under the Education Committee's oversight. In the past we have done a pretty good job of this. But in recent years, instructors have had to be almost begged to participate.

This Fall (as of this writing) a Novice/Tech class is NOT BEING OFFERED. There are a few individuals who have asked about us offering a class. I suppose they will be told to wait, or to study on their own. Could this have been avoided? Absolutely yes! How? If we had answered the questions: *What is our mission?* (To assist those who wish to

become Hams) *What is our plan?* (To teach a class.) *Who is our customer?* (People in our community.) *What does the customer value?* (The promise of Amateur Radio.)

How did this come about? I suggest it is because we have failed to adequately structure an Education Committee. How many members does the committee have? How many meetings has the committee held? When the committee learned there was no instructor, what did they do to solve the problem? Does the committee have a written plan for conducting classes at all levels or are the classes just supposed to happen? Has the committee tried to establish a staff of several instructors who can share the teaching load over time? Are new instructors being developed to replace those who might not be able to continue?

WHO IS OUR CUSTOMER?

That is relatively simple to answer. (A) The community is when there is an emergency which needs our communication assets. (B) Community organizations which use us to provide communications for their activities. (C) Those in the community who wish to have our help while learning about Amateur Radio. (D) And, our own membership.

WHAT ARE OUR RESULTS?

The answer to this would take a lot of thought. True, we have had many good results. We have had some failures. We have had some super efforts to overcome difficulties. But the question can only be answered in the context of what our mission is and how well we have accomplished those purposes. While we can be satisfied with what we have done; we must also keep our eye on what we should do.

WHAT DOES THE CUSTOMER VALUE?

That would require a survey and is beyond the scope of my message today.

WHAT IS OUR PLAN?

Since I have been a Ham, and a member of the AARC, we have had an Education Committee. Most of that time, the Education Committee consisted of a Chair and two other named individuals. Did they ever meet, plan, propose new educational adventures? Not much. Mostly, the Chair tried to find some instructors for the Novice-Technician Class, or taught it them self.

This is where I think we have a real problem. Joe (W2PVY) found that when he was thrust into the Vice President's position, there was not any real guidelines. He called for each area to develop guidelines. I do not think that went very far. I am particularly interested in whether our Education Committee following written by plans or doing things by the seat of their pants.

What we need is a committee which is loaded with some dynamic, forward looking people willing to do some essential things to make things work. Likewise, we need a membership which is willing to step forward and supply a stable basis of instructors, seminar leaders, program presenters, and general all-round elmers.

As mentioned, this fall, we are not even promoting a class. The previous instructor was not available, and the decision was made to just do nothing. This is entirely unacceptable. We might not have anyone show up for a class, but to not offer it - oh, my! We are really failing. It is easy to understand that the easy road was to not go out once again and beg for instructors week after week. Planning might have helped in this case.

This failing does not entirely fall on the Committee. The Board has to shoulder some of the responsibility. Did it hand out to the Chair of that committee (or any committee) what the full range of duties were? Did it schedule periodic, timely reports concerning the status of plans or problems encountered? Not really. Perhaps individuals were asked if they had anything to say. Chairs are not regularly scheduled to report on their Committee's status to the Board or they do not know what to report on in a timely fashion.

That is part of the problem. With a properly structured Educational Committee, plans might have already been made to have a cadre/pool of 6 to 8 individuals who would teach. These people might have to be pounded on the head to agree to teach, but with a reserve group of instructors, schedules can be worked out. That more or less was done informally a few years ago when Bill (KC4TQF) and Bob (W2BR) were instructors. They would bring in new individuals to cut their teeth in instruction.

You may have read elsewhere in this newsletter, Bill speak strongly about the failure of having a class. Bill is a big advocate for the educational component of our club.

The Educational Committee should have at least the following things in place.

I. A PLAN: A comprehensive written plan.

This plan should be available for each new committee in January of each year. If they wish to make some modifications to the plan, so be it. But they will know what they are supposed to do and allocate resources to carry out the plan. That plan would be passed on to the next year's committee. One plan for the Education Committee might encompass the following ideas.

- A. Create and maintain a basic "staff" of instructors who are willing to fit into a well design instructional plan. This would include a willingness to teach advanced courses, conduct special educational seminars. Then the committee would work to encourage members and area Hams to take enrichment courses.
- B. Create a basic group of members who would be willing to prepare and present an Introduction to Amateur Radio program at local schools on a regular basis (once every 1 or 2 years).
- C. Create a group who would be willing to assist the Vice President plan and schedule meeting programs. This group might develop an encouragement plan to get members to prepare programs.
- D. Prepare the basic publicity for all educational activities. The actual distribution may be done by the regular Publicity Committee.
- E. Establish a Working Calendar to make sure activities are conducted in a timely fashion. Much like the Public Service program does. Make regular reports to the Board.
- F. Prepare timely articles for the newsletter, letting the membership community know what is going on and what has been accomplished.
- G. Meet at least three (3) times per year and make timely reports.

How about the other committees?

Board Meeting August 3, 1999


- Joe, KD4RWX, moved that Grayson be paid \$140 for his tower which was installed at the 146.760 repeater site. Approved.
