# The President Speaks

Well folks, its October. For those of you VHF/UHF buffs out there, this means enhanced conditions. For the HF'ers, especially the low-band aficionados, you're looking at lower noise levels, and maybe even some good 80 and 160 meter conditions. Yes, winter is fast approaching.

I know most of us aren't quite ready for that white fluffy stuff, but it's coming before long, and now is a great time to check over your go-kit and make sure your emergency setup is up to snuff. In light of recent events I probably don't even need to say this, but as hams we're called on to be prepared to respond, and we all need to be ready to go when called on. Recently during Isabel, many club members assisted the local emergency services maintain essential communication links throughout the area when power and phone service went out. This was a great effort, and was greatly appreciated by the agencies we served.

Though there were many facets to our operation, there is one that I'd like to spend a few moments discussing. Early Friday morning, I was contacted by the amateur operator at the Red Cross Headquarters locally, and he asked if I could run a damage assessment net for a while on a local repeater. The purpose would be to enable hams to pass along damage reports as they saw them, and thus assist the Red Cross in locating problems. Of course I said yes, and over the course of the morning we passed along over thirty damage reports. At least as many stations participated, and we received reports from at least five different counties. The Red Cross

folks were delighted to have our help, and were very appreciative. As they received reports, they would direct their damage assessment teams to the location to assess the damage and fill out reports. However, there was one problem. They only had ten people (five teams) to cover five counties in one day. Throughout the morning they were begging for more volunteers to help out. In the course of things, the point was brought up that if hams were trained in this, they could pass along reports via radio as they saw them, thus eliminating the need to send damage assessment teams out to that location.

As I sat there thinking that morning, my mind wandered back to several years ago when the club decided not to pursue damage assessment training. Now, when the need arose, we were very limited in what we could do to help them out. If we had gone ahead with an hour-long class then, we could be so much more helpful to them when they needed it badly now. I strongly believe this is something we should pursue in the future. If we do have the Red Cross give us such training, I would encourage everyone to participate. It would be strictly voluntary, and since damage assessment is done after the fact, it would not interfere with our emergency communications duties. So, give it some thought, and please let me know if you're interested!

On another note, it sure is nice to have power back after six days without. It really makes generators and batteries worthwhile! I had a good laugh two days after Isabel passed through when I heard two local hams talking on 76, and one mentioned how the lack of power often means the lack of a good shower. The other responded by saying that yes, it's a good thing that odor isn't transmitted over radio. Hopefully everybody has their power back now, because we're having a club meeting October 14...nah, I'm just kidding on that one!

Seriously, though, the next club meeting is currently about two weeks away on Tuesday, October 14. The topic is will be a presentation by John, K4CQY on "How to Work DXCC Without Really Trying". Everybody be sure and make it out! So, until then, 73!

# Veep Peeps

Greetings! I hope that everyone weathered the hurricane with little or no inconvenience. Hopefully by now most if not all folks have their power back and are starting to get things back to normal.

We lost power, but it was only for 16 hours or so. What hurt worse was that my Carolina Windom snapped rather early in the storm Thursday afternoon. After the storm, we had a few trees down across the beginning of the driveway, but

the VDOT crew soon had them pushed aside and chopped up. By the following Wednesday, I had the replacement antenna wire from Radio Works and had my Carolina Windom back in the air.

Prior to the hurricane, I was in the process of re-working the shack. Originally, I didn't want to have a computer there. This was due to the fact that I spend my working hours working with computers and didn't want the computer to take away from the time that I wanted to use the radio. I was also looking for a good way to share the Internet connection that we have here at the house. To make a long story short, I found a way to share the Satellite connection between the four computers and moved the computer into the shack. At first, I thought I would just use it for e-mail and surfing the web with all the Amateur Radio web pages that I read all the time. This suited me fine for the short term. I was thinking about hooking up the Kenwood rig that I got at the 2nd Annual AARC Ham/Swapfest Picnic Extravaganza and how I would interface it with the computer and do some packet and access a DX cluster nearby. But, I hadn't gotten all of that going yet. It was still in the planning stages. I didn't really want to go too gung-ho, remember, we're supposed to do "radio" in the shack, not computers.

Then the inevitable happened. I went over to Jon Gefaell's place one day and he said, "Hey, I got something that I need to show ya that will blow your mind. He then proceeded to show me a suite of software called **DXLabs**. I had heard about this software, but didn't really give it much attention at the time. Jon showed me the "spot collector" and how the DX spots were just rolling in, the "commander" that controlled the radio when you double click on a "spot". How the "spot" is shown on a world map that you can zoom in and out and it shows the DX stations call, frequency and mode and the time that he was activated in the spot collector. Pathfinder looks up the stations call information and makes it readily available for you. There is also a propagation program and a very nice logging program also.

He almost went through the demo too fast. My head was reeling. I asked him, "How much did all that cost you?" "It's free" he said. I couldn't believe it. I asked him if it supported my Ten-Tec Jupiter. We looked and it appeared that it did not. He said "Hang on, I'll write to the guy that writes the software and ask him. He should let you know pretty soon via e-mail."

I'm accustomed to people writing free software, but I have never seen anything like this. It all seemed to work so flawlessly. Well, when I got home that evening, the author of the software had written me and said that it didn't support my radio at the moment, but, if I wanted to test some software and give him feed back, he would add support for it. I was simply amazed. The thing that took the longest was me getting the antenna back up in the air. The software was waiting on me.

I have the software installed and mostly configured. It's going to take a while to get comfortable with all the power that it gives you, but I'll get the hang of it and start working those DX stations that are out there.

I'm so impressed by this software and what it can do for you that I have asked Jon to give a presentation on this software and his experiences working DX stations in the short time that he has gotten his General ticket.

An outline of his presentation is as follows:

### **Around The World on 90 Days**

This talk by Jon Gefaell K4CQY will explore Jon's experiences having upgraded after 12 years to a General Class license. Since starting his HF operations during the ARRL Field Day, Jon has managed to work 100(+) DXCC entities in 90 days with 100W and a dipole. You can do it too. Along the way he's learned a lot about how to automate a station on a budget, operate exciting digital modes like PSK and SSTV and learn the lay of the bands. Learn about how you can have more fun with Amateur Radio by attending this talk which we hope will be the first of many contributions from club members sharing their experiences and skills with their stations and operations.

# Club Business

## AARC Board Minutes September 9, 2003

Board Members Present: Steve KF4ZGD, Pete W4PRT, Marty AG4DN, Steve KD4HBX. All other members of the Board were absent. It was noted that there was no quorum present. No decisions were made or votes taken.

Steve KF4ZGD opened the informal session of the Board at  $6:35\ PM.$ 

**Finance:** Steve presented the financial report for Ralph. As of 31 August 2003, total Revenues were \$2722.51. Total Expenses were \$1179.29. Excess Revenues were \$1543.22. Balances committed to the Repeater Fund \$1082.68, Packet Fund \$78.51 and AARC Fund \$4261.53, Total Balances \$5422.72. (Complete report available upon request.)

Insurance Billing for an additional \$182.00 from Cabell Insurance Associates was received and presented by Marty. Both Marty and Pete believed an explanation for this bill should be provided. Marty indicated he would call the insurer and request an explanation prior to payment being made.

**Programs:** Pete indicated that he had not finalized the program for next month. Marty noted that the Fluvanna County Communications Officer had recently set up a new

system for the county. He might be willing to make a presentation. Pete said he would follow up.

Pete indicated that ARRL had tabulated the Field Day results and he would present them, hopefully if received, at the next meeting.

**Education:** Steve noted that no students had shown up for the Tech or General classes last week. It is believed that the problem was communication with those who indicated a desire to attend classes. Follow up action would be taken.

**Activities:** Steve KD4HBX raised the issue of continuing refreshments for the general membership meeting. The responsibility currently is being shared by Steve and Pete. It can become a burden at times. A poll of the membership will be taken at the general meeting to gauge their feelings and willingness to assist.

Steve presented a bill for the expenditures made for the picnic. The total was \$171.12 well within the approved amount. (See detailed bill upon request.) Pete and the members of the board thanked Steve for an excellent job.

Steve KF4ZGD noted that the club participation in the Albemarle County Fair was a great success and we should continue participation. This recommendation was made regardless of the severe storm that leveled the tent. There was also discussion of various enhancements to the club display for 2004.

#### **New Items**:

Marty presented an E-mail from ARRL requesting financial support for their campaign to defeat "Broadband over Power Lines." This threat is considered devastating to Amateur Radio. Since the Board could not take action it was decided to bring the matter to the general meeting and request the AARC contribute \$100 to the ARRL Defense Fund.

Steve KF4ZGD noted that there is a requirement to put together a nominating committee for club officers at this month's general meeting. Various names were noted and the following will be presented to the membership for approval: Rick-Chairman, Pete, Marty, Ernie and Bob.

The informal session of the Board closed 7:10 PM.

# Regular Meeting September 9, 2003

Steve KF4ZGD opened the meeting at 7:38 PM.

Following the introduction of members and guests, Officer Karla Bower, Community Relations Coordinator for the Albemarle County Police Department, accompanied by her supervisor Lt. Newton, made a presentation on the Mobile Watch Program in the county. She presented the essentials of the program whereby private citizens, companies or organizations are trained to keep their eyes and ears open to strange and unusual activity on the streets, their postal routes, while checking telephone lines, etc. She showed a

beacon light sold by the police department, the Senior Center and JABA at a price of \$5.95. When turned on, the light will continuously flash attracting attention in emergency situations. She distributed a list of Emergency Preparedness items and a booklet used for training classes in "Mobile Watch." The presentation was very well received by the membership as indicated by the number of questions asked.

# Battery Support Under Unexpected Demands

Over the past few years members of our club have become interested in the permanent battery operation of their stations. I think two things brought this about. The first is the sudden availability of many inexpensive, surplus, high-powered gel cells. The second was the introduction of the Anderson Power Pole and the Rig Runner--the 12-volt version of the AC power strip.

At this same time many found that Walmart offered a small, affordable 1.5-amp charger which was well conceived in that it cut off when the battery under charged was at its correct voltage and again began to be recharged as the battery fell below some predetermined lower limit.

When the equipment powered by the gel cells is intermittent in nature, this little charger has time to replenish the battery even though normal operation may have been such that more power was drained than was returned. I found that an over-night recharge was usually more than enough.

I have run my monitor receiver, my Kenwood TS-570 and my Kenwood 700 at the same time with no problems.

The powers that be at the Old Dominion Emergency net told me that my power system would likely be capable of about 16 hours of reliable service if my station was used as a Net Control Station.

With Isabel looming, I wondered how my system would really hold up under the duty cycle I knew I was facing. What I did, which worked fine, was to take my 10-ampere auto charger and substitute it for the 1.5 amp unit described earlier. Like its tiny cousin, its charge rate fluctuated with increasing or decreasing load. The "little fellow" is either on or off; this larger guy was always on, but at a low rate when the battery was considered charged.

The ability to interchange between the two chargers was made very simple by having the right cables fitted with Power Poles.

I'm here to say that this system worked very well. As long as I had commercial or home generator support, my system would **NOT** have gone down.

I do **NOT** recommend using the larger unit all the time. I like the idea that the Walmart unit does not attempt to put a charge into the battery at all times. When no equipment is operating, the little charger seldom cycles.


