

# The President's Letter

Hello and Greetings to all and best wishes for 2008 from ARS K4DND. I hope the rest of the AARC is looking forward to this coming year with optimism equal to mine. With a new slate of AARC officers and some new board members, the AARC should move forward on both interesting activities and challenging tasks in the coming year.

We are going to return to the club organization as dictated in the AARC Bylaws, which calls for each elected Board member

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to serve on one of the standing club committees. I am pleased to report that each Board member has enthusiastically agreed to do so. In addition I am grateful to have Josh KG4NGV accept an administrative appointment to the Board to replace an elected member who chose not to serve.

To review, the standing committees are as follows: Technical (supervised by Bill AD6JV), Activities (supervised by Jay K4AZV), Education (supervised by Dennis K4THE), Fundraising (supervised by Linda K15LLB), and Publications (supervised by Josh KG4NGV). The Board member responsible for each committee will be looking to fill the committee chairperson slot, and in conjunction with the new chairperson, recruit club members to serve on these committees. My hope is that all AARC members are willing to serve on at least one committee, thus making the AARC an organization whose direction is determined by the collective voice of all its members.

I know some of you will be thinking that you don't really have the time to serve on a committee. Well, you do have the time to assist in some small way; you just need to decide which committee is best suited to the contribution that you want to make. So think about these five committees, and decide on which committee or committees you will be most able to contribute. Then contact the respective Board member or members and offer your services.

Early discussions with the other officers of the new Executive Committee focused on the direction of the AARC for the coming year, and the following points came from those talks. First, we need to increase public awareness concerning our hobby. We can do this in a number of ways that will be explored by both the Activities and Education Committees. But for a start, we need a Public Information Officer that will be able to promote the AARC and Amateur Radio in all local public forums, as well as interact with PIOs of other organizations. Second, we need to bring back old members of the AARC that we haven't seen or heard from in some time. For whatever reasons those people are no longer affiliated with the AARC, they need to be invited back and those invitations need to continue until they do come back. Third, we must recruit young people into Amateur Radio; without them there isn't going to be a future for this outstanding radio service. We are going to do this through approaches to the local scouting and Civil Air Patrol youth organizations for starters. Fourth, we need to emphasize continuing education for AARC members. We will find those interested in learning new skills, experimenting with new digital modes, starting in contesting or DXing as examples, and for them, provide opportunities for exploring those interests that go far beyond the scope of monthly meeting presentations.

If we are able to accomplish these four goals, in addition to our normal yearly schedule of club activities, we should have a busy and productive year. Meanwhile, frequently check the AARC website for current activities, news items, upcoming events and committee progress. Also, stay tuned for a web accessible membership list.

Please join us for the January dinner meeting to be held the evening of the 13<sup>th</sup> from 5 to 8PM at the Elk's Lodge just north of Rte 250 on Rte 20N. We should have a very fun evening; the price of \$18/person includes one free raffle ticket. I hope to see you all there. # The AARC Education Committee

This is one of five committees specified in the By-Laws. I am in the process of trying to find members for this group (the week before Christmas).

I think this committee should be responsible for the formulation of overall education goals and current action items, based on the existing and anticipated needs of the club. I do not believe that the committee members should be responsible for actually conducting training (although they might do so if they wish). Some of the things that we will be considering are:

**Requirements** - Needs of the club members

Training of entry level new hams - It seems that the formal 10 week course method does not work too well in these busy times. The self-study approach perhaps combined with a one day course seems to be they way to go these days. Maybe self-study with an Elmer-on-call for questions would be an alternative.

## There are many Internet assets available for

newcomers and older-timers. There are several sites that have exams that can be taken on-line for practice. There are others that have good tutorial and useful reference material. We could assemble links to these and put them on our web site.

There are many publications available too. - Gordon West and W5YI have good training materials. The ARRL has books and CDs for all three license classes too. We could assemble links to these sites and put them on our web site also.

Elmer Program - I think the committee should formalize an Elmer program whereby each new licensee would be linked up with one or more club members who could help them develop their skills and increase their knowledge. We would need to solicit volunteers based on their interests, time available and perhaps location near the new ham.

Continuing Education - Technology keeps changing at an accelerated rate and some of the older folks (like me) and could use information to update our understanding or skills (from some of our younger or more experienced members). Determining the needs of the members would be a first step. Perhaps some of the monthly presentations could be directed to these needs.

Youth - The Boy Scouts have a radio merit badge and an annual "Hamboree" - the exact name escapes me [Jamboree on the Air (JOTA) - Ed.] - where they talk to other scouts worldwide via ham radio. The Civil Air Patrol cadets are also involved with communications for search & rescue, etc. The committee should plan an outreach program to bring these involved youths into ham radio and assist in their education. Programs in our schools might be a long range goal.

And there are probably a bunch of other good topics that will come to your minds too. Please give your ideas and suggestions to me. I look forward to participating with you during the upcoming year and serving on your Board of Directors again.

Jay called for a motion to close the Board Meeting at 7:32 PM. A motion was made, second and approved with no comment.

# DX Info

AI, K9MBQ

This column is intended to inform about and stir interest in DX'ing among members who want to pursue this aspect of our hobby. As a start, this edition will address some myths about DX operation, recap the K9MBQ Nov post-meeting DX Pitch, and note some expected DX activities.

Myth #1: Because the sunspot cycle is at its low point, there is no DX to work, and what there is too difficult for the average Ham to work. Response: Not True! Although the high HF bands (10, 12, 15M) are pretty quiet, 17M has many openings, 20M is very much open in daylight hrs (sunrisesunset), and the low bands (30, 40, 75, and 160M) get hot from just before sunset to just after sunrise, with much good grayline DX on 40 and 80M.

Myth #2: I can't work DX with a dipole and 100W.

Response: Also, not true! When a particular band is open to various parts of the world, a good operator with low power and a modest antenna can work DX stations. A key is to not fight physics – look for DX when the bands are open to a particular area (e.g. Europe on 17 and 20M after our sunrise). Also, many DX nets are happy to help new DX'ers. Try the 247 DX net (14.247MHZ) in the afternoon on weekdays. Recall that max power allowed on 30M is 200W, so if you have a bent for CW, that band is a good place to operate with a modest station.

OST and CQ DX columns; ARRL DX News – posted on the ARRL Web site (www.arrl.org) and will be sent to ARRL members weekly free upon request; The Daily and Weekly DX – Bernie McLenny, W3UR – QST DX Editor – publishes (\$27/yr) (Bernie@dailydx.com); QRZ DX – weekly e-mail

bulletin, contact Carl Smith (N4AA@dxpub.com); INDEXA – quarterly e-mail bulletin and <u>Daily DX info session @2330Z on 14236khz</u> (www.indexa.org).

When/Where to work DX . . . First is the Old-Fashioned way – tune around and listen; use a DX cluster to find out who is on and who is working them . . . many options, but suggest the cluster on www.eham.net (best to subscribe, but free trial); learn about propagation (CQ magazine column) and there are other sources) so you know what you can work when; listen to and/or check-in to DX nets.

Operating Tips: Good antenna is the most important item in the station – put up the best one you can make, afford, fit; Listen a lot!! Before you transmit; to work DX, you have to hear the DX station . . . and he has to hear you, so for split freq ops, be sure to call where he is listening; Many DX stations work CW, so go where they are.

Recent big DX news is that the island of St Barthelemy was added to the DXCC country/entity list for all QSOs 14 Dec 2007 or later. This caused a big stir before and during the Christmas holidays since OH0XX and OH2BH went to St Barts and operated as FJ/OH2AM on 17, 20 and 40M. This was a great Christmas present for us country hunters. There are many DX stations on the bands regularly who are easy to work and nice people. Give them a call and have some DX fun. GOOD DX!


