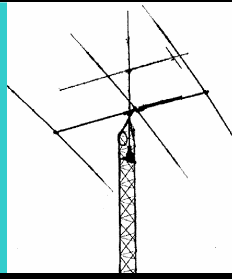

DX Notes

Before I get into some choice DX stations expected to be on, let's first discuss the common DX practice of operating "Split".

It is a common for DX-peditions and rare DX stations to operate SPLIT. This means that the station transmits on one frequency while listening on another freq or range of frequencies – happens on both CW and SSB.

For example, on 20M SSB, the DX station might call on 14195 KHZ and listen up 5 to 10 KHZ, so he will be listening for calls in the 14200 to 14205 KHZ range. So, if you call him, you need to transmit in the 14200-14205 KHZ range.

Another example on CW – DX on 14010, listening up 3 . . . so he is listening on 14013KHZ and transmitting on 14010. Most transceivers have a SPLIT capability that makes this mode easy to do, but be sure you know how to do it before trying so you don't transmit on the DX freq and QRM him.

Be assured that other stations will let you know quickly if you do. If not sure, do a test with another local.

So, on to some upcoming DX stations of interest:

- T6, Afghanistan: K9GY will be there for 1 year starting in mid-May. Best time on 20M to listen is around 0800-1000 our time. He will QSL via LoTW (Log Book of the World), but Direct will also work.
- P2, Papua New Guinea: Five Europeans will be operating from 5 different islands with various call from 2-27 April; all bands and modes. See their web site: www.p29ni.weebly.com
- XV, Vietnam: OH4MDY will be operating as XV2RZ 4-17 Apr, 80-6M CW and SSB. QSL Direct to XU7MDY; on line log at www.clublog.org/logsearch/XV2RZ

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- 5X, UGANDA: UV5EVJ, Serge, will operate as 5X1VJ 21 Mar-8 June on 7-28 MHZ, CW and SSB. QSL to home call with SAE and \$2.

Report from Hawaii

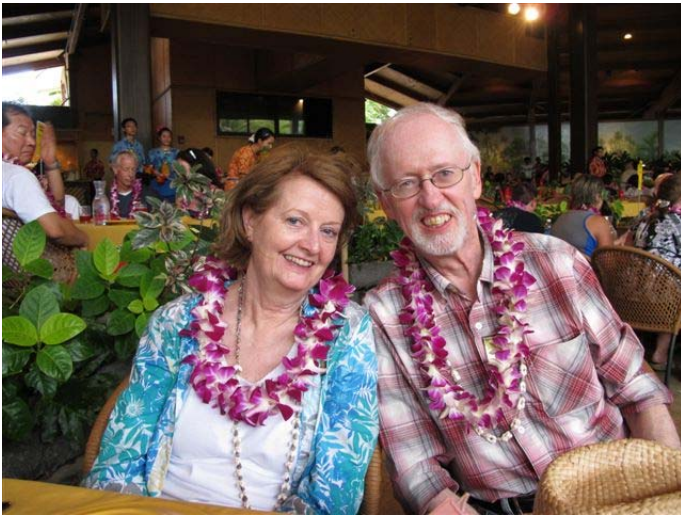

A Real Emergency Experience

AARC Emergency Coordinator, Dave Damon, K4KND, requested that Jim, K4BAV, write a brief description of his recent emergency experience. Jim and his wife Becky were on the big island of Hawaii on the night of September 11th when the tsunami from Japan arrived. Dave feels that valuable lessons may be gained by club ARES member from Jim's unexpected experience.

Recall that a 9.0 Richter scale earthquake hit Japan, generating a giant tidal wave about 23 feet high, causing devastation of property and thousands of lost lives in coastal areas of Japan. This forceful tsunami wave then crossed the Pacific Ocean, hitting the west side of the big island. The Royal Kona hotel, a complex of three buildings, was located in the bull's eye as the target for the Japanese tsunami. Here is Jim & Becky's brief story.

Becky and I were on a rare vacation, our first visit to Hawaii. AARC member, John Ball, KJ4RPP, a native Hawaiian, had already given us great advice on what to see and do in Hawaii.

We checked into the Royal Kona at 2:27 p.m. and were assigned room 217 on the second floor of this picturesque hotel complex. Sunny and about 82 degrees, the weather certainly lived up to its reputation as paradise.

Catching up on jet lag, Becky and I had gone to bed early for their first night sleep at the Royal Kona. About an hour after hitting the sack, a noise outside, a sound like a loud vacuum cleaner, got me up and out on our balcony.

In the distance was a red flashing light with a few people standing around. Assuming this was a medical ambulance or perhaps a fire drill in an adjacent building, we returned to peaceful sleep. About an hour later, at 11:15 o'clock, the sound of a fist pounding on our room door got us up from

sleep again. "Security; we're evacuating the building," said a loud voice outside of our door.



Who would have guessed?

I hurriedly put on blue jeans and a jacket over my pajamas. We hustled downstairs. We also noticed that the hotel was virtually empty. A hotel staff member downstairs instructed us to return to our room, to pack all medications and valuables and to leave the hotel, possibly not to return. He said that we had at least two hours before a tsunami was expected to hit the Royal Kona.

Becky and I easily repacked out suitcases, which had not yet been unpacked. As we dashed out of the hotel, another staff member handed us two pieces of paper. One described the evacuation procedure and the other page contained a map of evacuation centers: Wal-Mart and Lowes. Becky asked if most of the people and already gone. "Yeah, they have" responded the hotel staffer.

Our rented car was parked in the hotel parking lot, easy to access. We noticed the parking lot was mostly empty; we were apparently one of the last hotel residents to leave. Emergency personnel had already placed orange traffic cones to block certain streets. We drove away from the Royal Kona hotel at 11:25 p.m. A handful of policemen and people with orange vests directed us to a street that was uphill from the hotel.

Soon we were lost. But our rented white Chevy had a full tank of gasoline, so we felt optimistic. At 12:20 midnight, we pulled over on a deserted road parking area. This was somewhere near a mountain top. Only one other car was parked in this area.

We introduced ourselves to the occupants of the second car. This was a young Chinese couple. They express joy that they were not alone. The young man explained that they live in Boston, and that he has a PhD in electronics and works at MIT. His wife was just about to earn her PhD in electronics, they revealed.

Lei, the young man, set up a camera on a tripod and snapped a photo of the four of us. He then snapped a few photos of the beautiful night sky. They offered us water and food, but we had plenty of bottled water and snacks with us in our backpack.

The night continued. No other cars passed by. We slept comfortably in the car seats, listening periodically to the car radio. The radio station we were monitoring had power problems. It kept going off the air. The radio announcer commented, "We are actually in an emergency bunker right now." That could account for their unreliable transmissions. At 4:37 a.m., our son Matt telephoned and asked if we were okay. "I was just worried about y'all," explained Matt. Just think, we almost didn't bother to bring along our cell phone! The most useful things we had with us proved to be the cell phone and a miniature LED flashlight. Snacks and bottled water were part of our everyday traveling kit. Jackets were helpful for the cool evening.

Neil Abercrombie, governor of Hawaii, spoke on the radio. Schools were declared closed for the following day. At 6:02 a.m. the sun was already up as the radio announcer stated, "we are still waiting for the all clear from state and city officials." He emphasized many times during the night – don't return to your homes or hotels until the all clear was announced. "The tsunami warning is still in effect," stated the radio voice.

The morning radio news noted that the U.S. stock market fell and that, "President Obama will address the nation." They again added, "Public schools are closed." The radio news declared this to be "the largest earthquake in recorded history of Japan."

By now, we observed cars passing us going up the road. So at 7:24 a.m. we decided to venture up the road to find some breakfast. Our new Chinese friends in the white car next to us were still asleep, so we did not disturb them.

Just around the corner from where we were parked was a sign that read: 2,500 feet altitude. Ah, we had selected a good spot! Soon we found a Burger King and bought a light breakfast.

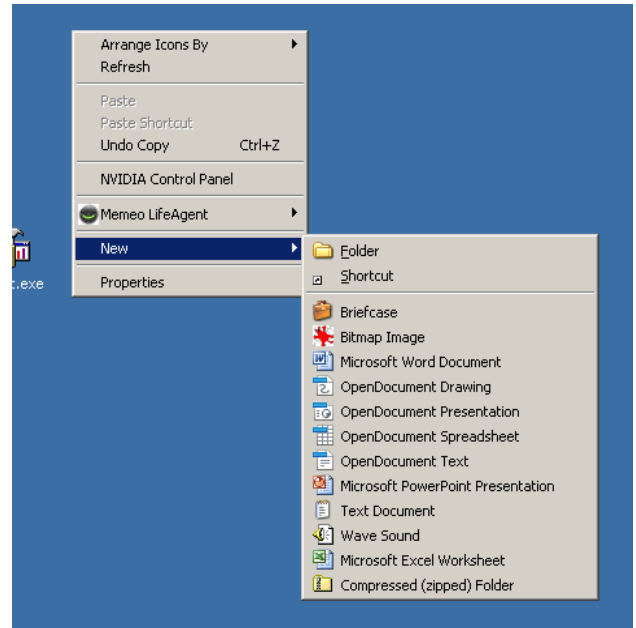
So what valuable lessons did we learn from this emergency experience? Cell phone, flashlight, snacks and bottled water were most useful. A full tank of gasoline was also critical. I had considered carrying along my handheld two meter transceiver, but decided not to. This would have been one more gadget to get through security and one more thing to keep track of. However, Harry, W2HD, advised me that the HT would have been useful. This option might make a good club program for an upcoming club program.

Becky and I returned to the Royal Kona hotel the next night. For the following several days, loud noises from heavy equipment could be heard as smashed sea walls were repaired, streets were repaved and flooded shops were dried out and reopened. Ah, this was indeed a vacation of adventure!

Computer Tip

Many of us are operating digital modes these days, and often use physical adapters that convert a USB port on a laptop to an RS-232 serial port.

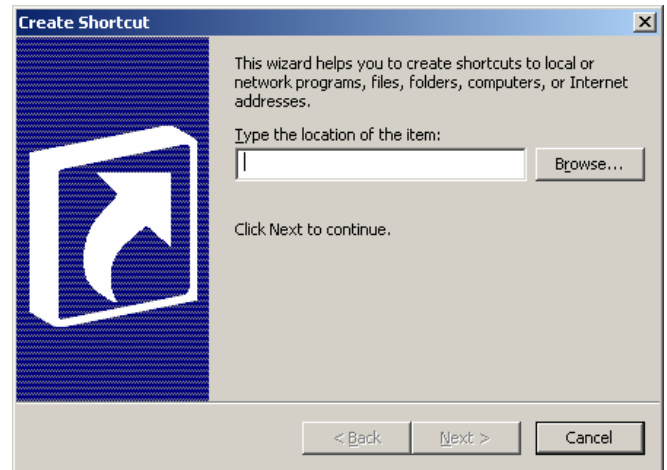
One of the odd characteristics of using USB-serial converters is that if you happen to plug into a different USB socket on the computer, the serial port will be assigned a different port number.

Then the software that you are using is looking for a port number that has changed. Obviously this makes for potential problems in getting your software to work. Either you have to change the port number assigned to the serial device, or you have to change the port number in the software package that is going to be used.

One thing that you might want to do is check your windows device manager, but that is now taking more discrete steps to locate, particularly if you are using Windows 7.

So here is the solution that I can offer to make this whole process easier.

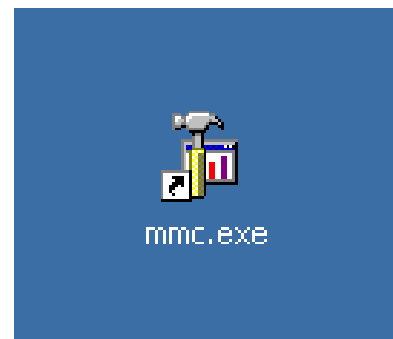
A. With your mouse cursor in a clear area on your desktop, right click the mouse. That will let you create a new desktop shortcut.



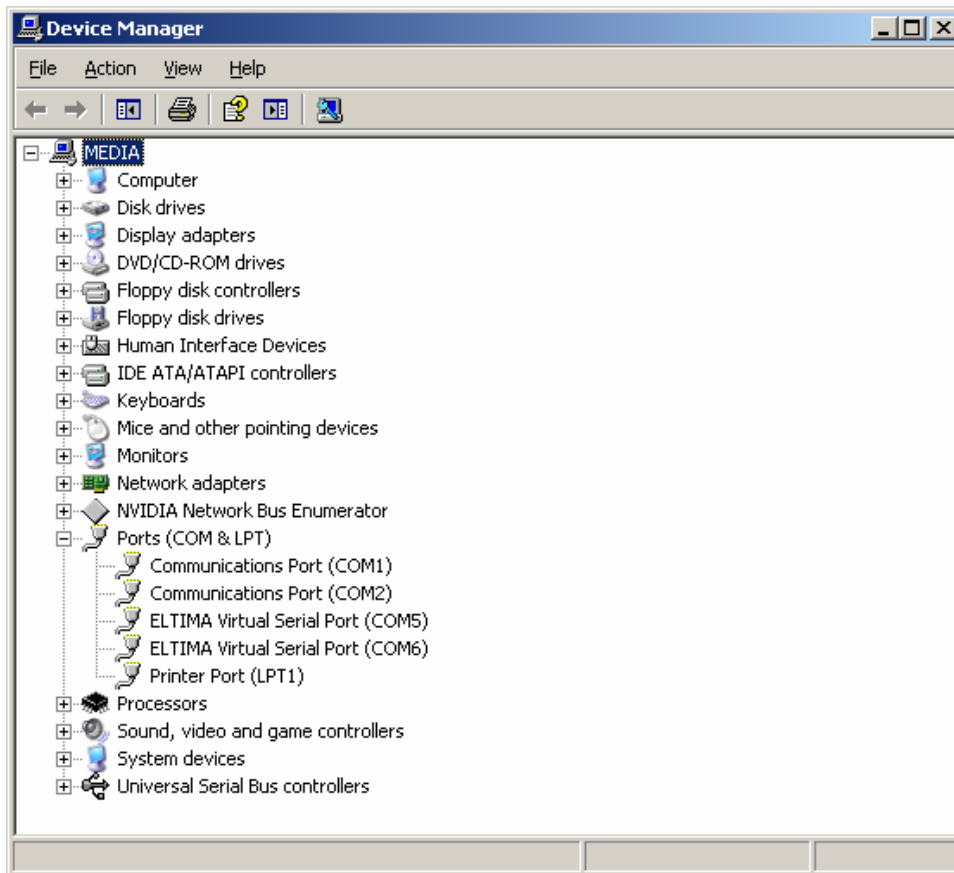
C. For the "location of the item", type in the following:

c:\windows\system32\mmc.exe devmgmt.msc

D. That will create a new icon on your desktop that may look like:



E. Now when you click on this new desktop icon, you will go directly to your device manager, where you can check the port assignments and be up and operating will ease.
