## President's Corner

My first "real" ham gear was a Hammarlund HQ110AC, a Knight T-150A, and a dipole in my parents' apple trees. I then upgraded to a DX-100, a Hallicrafters SX-101 Mk III, and a Hygain TH-4 beam at 45 feet. The DX bug bit me and I have always enjoyed DXing. However, I am not into

working each new country on every band and every mode and I dabble in contests. Nothing beats a good, solid rag chew.

Ham Radio led to my majoring in Electronics Engineering, obtaining a BSEE and MSEE. After a 42 year Federal career as an electronics engineer, with a specialty in radar meteorology, I retired and relocated from Norman, OK (Go Sooners!) to Earlysville, VA. During my career, I also lived in Washington, DC and Denver.

Some of my club goals include making our meetings more interesting to improve attendance and expanding our membership by appealing to both new hams ("novices") and existing ("old-timers"). One of my ideas to attract some young blood into Ham radio would be to set-up some demonstration stations in addition to Field Day. ## The Topic for AARC February 10 Meeting: Single-Board Computers for Amateur Radio Speaker: Mike McPherson KQ9P

There has been a lot of excitement over the past few years about low-cost (~\$50) single-board computers (SBCs) such as the Raspberry Pi, the BeagleBone Black, the Arduino, and a host of others that are less familiar. Most of these computers have sufficient horsepower and RAM to run full versions of the Linux operating system, supporting one or two applications running simultaneously. This combination of price and performance allows for the creation of very cost-effective and flexible "computing appliances" with a broad range of real-world applications, including many in amateur radio. They are a cheap and easy way to make lights blink, buzzers buzz, servos spin, and communicators communicate.

For example, most of you are aware that K4DND's 146.730 MHz repeater on Carter's Mountain is normally linked to 30 or more repeaters via the IRLP network; there is a dedicated Raspberry Pi making that magic happen.

There are two SBC-related events in the Club in February. **At the regular Tuesday, February 10 meeting** Mike, KQ9P will give an overview of SBCs, the capabilities of the most popular models and their ecosystems, the applications for amateur radio, and some ideas of how to get started.

**On Saturday, 21 February 2015**, from 8am until noon the Club will hold an Arduino Workshop at the Charlottesville-Albemarle Rescue Squad (CARS) building at 828 McIntire Road, Charlottesville, VA 22902 (the

intersection of US-250 and McIntire Road, <http://mapq.st/1sAWbCF>). This will be a hands-on introduction to this very simple but very capable SBC, a great starting point for learning about real-world applications of embedded computers. We'll familiarize ourselves with the hardware and software, then work through some examples that will get participants started toward using SBCs in their own projects.


