During the April meeting discussion about a new logo for our club, I mentioned that despite being a member of the ARRL since 1963, I was not familiar with the term "Special Service Club (SSC)." A few days after the meeting, Dave Damon, K4DND, provided me some background on the SSC Program and the club's history as a SSC. I delved into the SSC program to ensure I now understood it and I submitted an online application to ensure we remain a SSC. I want to share what I learned with you.

The ARRL states on their website, "A club that exists to go above and beyond for their communities and for Amateur Radio is what defines a Special Service Club (SSC). They are the leaders in their Amateur Radio communities who provide active training classes, publicity programs and actively pursue technical projects and operating activities."

There is not a doubt in my mind that AARC truly is a Special Service Club because we excel in all the above requirements for a ARRL SSC. I have been an active ham since 1963 and a member of multiple ham clubs in six states

during my career. AARC is no doubt the best club I have ever been associated with for many reasons. ## Item of Interest

CAPE TOWN -- More than 500 research abstracts are being presented at the 19th World Conference on Disaster and Emergency Medicine this week, representing a range of topics from clinical care to training and education.

Here are three that caught my eye:

#### Ham Radio and Disaster Response

When all else fails, count on a worldwide system of amateur radio operators to get the message out.

Susan Speraw and colleagues from the University of Tennessee College of Nursing presented a qualitative survey of a small group of American amateur ("ham") radio operators -- an often overlooked and potentially critical asset in post-disaster communications.

Thousands of ham radio operators worldwide operate voluntarily, responding to disasters with communications capabilities that often remain robust after Internet connections, cell service, land lines, and satellite links have been disrupted. The researchers found that the ham radio operators are sometimes able to make lifesaving connections

simply because they have the ability to pass a message along.

All of the radio operators interviewed were part of a global network, and had the skills to connect with colleagues rapidly during disasters -- often working without external power supplies.

Bottom line: Ham radio operators worldwide are an underutilized and critical component of disaster response systems. Emergency managers should understand what they do and integrate them into disaster plans

# AARC Minutes for the April 2015 Meeting

**Board Meeting** – The board meeting was called to order at 6:58 p.m. by President Ed Berkowitz. All board members were present.

Secretary's report: Requested approval of the March minutes as published in the newsletter. Minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter.

Larry gave the Treasurer's report for N4UVA as follows:

Treasurer's Report: Beginning balance: \$5,498.20, debits-\$415.35, credits-\$218.19 with an ending balance-\$5,301.94.

Larry offered his Field Day report stating Field Day will be held at the 911 Center at 2306 Ivy Road on Route 250.

He asked members to check in on the sign-up sheet on the club's web site to help with all the field day activities. He announced that the club will have a pot luck supper Saturday at 6 p.m. with club providing chicken and drinks. He stated that the board had approved up to \$275 for food for field day. He asked that members attending bring a side dish to share.

Larry reported that members of his committee had recommended the club purchase a hex bean for use during field day with an approximate cost being \$600. The report was put on the floor as a motion. After some discussion of the pros and cons, the motion was approved to fund the bean up to \$600 by a majority vote.

Larry reported that he had obtained a commitment from a local company to provide two port-a-johns for field day. He also asked about power for the site and Dave Damon acknowledged he will provide his generator.

President Berkowitz announced the board had approved making Kenneth Kang an Honorary Member in recognition of his continued service to the club after having moved to California. The approval of the club was placed on the floor. The designation was approved unanimously.

A.J. Miller reported that the evening's raffle had produced \$54 for the club.

Bill Phillips reported the 2015 Science Fair was one of the best he had ever participated in. The club awarded four prizes of \$50 each and a copy of the book *Riding the Short Waves*. The seniors were also given a *License Manual*.

There was no old business to be brought up.

The club broke into small sessions of personal concern.

The meeting adjourned at 8:57 p.m.



1966-1988 Naval Officer:

66 U.S. Naval Academy graduate and served 22 years as a Surface Warfare Officer. Alan Swinger's Navy career encompassed a wide range of operational, administrative, programmatic, and analytic activities including two tours of duty in Chief of Naval Operations' (CNO's) Program Resource Appraisal Division (N81) in the Pentagon. His operational experience includes Carrier Battle Group Staff Operations Officer, Commanding Officer of an FFG-7 class guided missile frigate, and various operational sea tours in other warships. He also served an in-country tour of duty in Vietnam in the Naval Advisory Group. During his first tour of Duty aboard USS Ozbourn (DD-846), the ship was involved in numerous combat actions with North Vietnamese gun batteries off of North Vietnam. In one, the ship was hit several times. He was controlling ship movements at the time and successfully maneuvered it at Flank speed out of harm's way, thus avoiding further damage. Then Ensign Swinger as Damage Control officer led his fire-fighting teams to successfully douse the resulting fires, prevent secondary ordnance explosions, and prevent casualties to the crew. He retired from active service in 1988 with the rank of Captain.

#### <u>1988 – 2007 Defense Consultant:</u>

Captain Swinger then went on to a 20+ year career in the Defense Analysis business as part of the Navy and Defense Department team. One of his major achievements was to lead a team in performing the pioneering analysis on how the Navy could contribute and accomplish Ballistic Missile Defense of the Homeland. This effort subsequently led to the upgrade of most of the Aegis Cruisers and Destroyers in the Fleet today with this Strategic Defense capability. He left the Defense business as the Senior VP of a major Consulting and Analysis company after having built a \$25M business with an 85 member

staff.

Mr. Swinger holds a Master Degree in Operations Research from the Naval Post Graduate School and a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy. He was a Federal Executive Fellow at the Brookings Institution, and he is a Distinguished Graduate of the U.S. Naval War College.

<u>Family:</u> Sandra, his wife of 45 years, is an Antique dealer in the Charlottesville area; his daughter Pamela Knight is a professional horse trainer in Boyce, Va; and, his son Commander (select) Mark Swinger, USN is a Navy Fighter pilot. They have two granddaughters, Olivia and Madelyn.
