



The September meeting will be our Annual Picnic/Silent Auction set for September 20 in the Pavilion at Darden Towe Park. The action will start at 5 p.m. with dinner being served at 6.



The Board of Directors met on August 8, 2015 in a conference room at the new Northside Library. The conference room that we used at the library met our needs, there was no fee to use it, and it was reserved over the telephone. A summary of the discussions is included in this month's Beacon.

In lieu of a regular meeting, the September AARC meeting will be our Club's annual picnic.

Our annual picnic will be held at The Pavilion at Darden Towe Park, located at 1445 Darden Towe Park Road, Charlottesville, VA, on Sunday, September 20. Like last year, we will hold a swap-fest in the form of a silent auction. This would be a great opportunity to sell some of your "old toys" and buy some "new toys" related to Amateur Radio. We will start the festivities at 5 PM. Dinner will be served at 6 PM. Unless you sign up, we will not be able to purchase the correct quantity of food. Additional details including the

sign-up sheet are at the top of the posts on the AARC website.

At the August Board meeting, we discussed the possibility of the Club's sponsoring a Hamfest. We decided to start off small by inviting all hams in the Central Virginia area to attend our swap-fest and picnic. So please put out the word about this event to your fellow ham friends who are not members of AARC.

Speaking of the Club Website, the website has been rehosted from Drupal to Word Press. This major upgrade was accomplished by our new webmaster, Mike McPherson, KQ9P. Word Press is more appropriate hosting software for our webpage, is much easier to edit, and has resulted in our website's being more robust and responsive, especially for those using a smart phone. Kudos to Mike McPherson, KQ9P for a job well done!

As we approach the fall, it is time to start planning our antenna projects. With declining sunspot activity, we can partially compensate for poor band conditions by enhancing our "antenna farms." As you plan your antenna projects, THINK SAFETY. Particular care must be taken if there are any power lines in the vicinity, even the relatively low voltage ones used for powering just one or two houses. The antenna should be sited so that even if the antenna were to fall, there would no possibility whatsoever of it's touching the line. Fairly recently, a well-known WV ham died from contacting a power line while installing an antenna.

When working on your antenna projects, use appropriate safety equipment, such as eye protection when using potato launchers or slingshots for your wire antennas, hard hats when serving as the ground crew on any tower projects, a full-body harness with proper lanyards when working on your tower, etc. Moreover, you should always have a buddy to assist you and also to serve as a safety observer.

Be cognizant of potential climbing hazards, overhead power lines, and damaged ladders. Your Club needs you all to remain in good health.

AARC will participate in this year's Boy Scout Apple Harvest event, sponsored by the Monticello District, Stonewall Jackson Area Council and held at Pleasant Grove House Museum and Welcome Center, Fluvanna County. On Saturday, October 31, we will set-up and operate a station to demonstrate ham radio to Cub and Boy Scouts. This will be a great recruiting opportunity. Dennis Terribile, WR4I, will serve as club chair for Apple Harvest.

Our VP's Report by Larry - K4JZQ



Thanks to those 35 or so members who attended the AARC August monthly meeting and heard plans for the new MESH network advocated by Keith Elkin, KB3TCB of Frederick, Md. This certainly is something that could be helpful to our area during emergency incidents. It should give us all food for thought on how to go about it. We anticipate that further updates on this mode of communication will be provided to us by KQ9P, Mike McPherson, who was the inspiration for this particular presentation. Thanks Mike for all you do!

There will be no formal monthly meeting in September so no speaker is scheduled. However, for October and November please mark your calendars for the following speakers at AARC. On Tuesday, October 13 John Green, KX4P, will give a presentation including slides and video illustrating his work in restoring a Collins KWM-1 transceiver. He writes this about the rig:

"The KWM-1 was a historic milestone in HF radio communications ushering in the first commercially successful transceiver. Prior to its development, ham communications used separate receiver and transmitter equipment. By the mid 1950s, most stations were true "boat anchors" using 120 pound AM transmitters and 65 pound receivers, all connected together with relays, cables, wires, etc. The Collins "Gold Dust Twins" (KWS-1 and 75A4) were top of the line examples.

In 1956 Collins produced the KWM-1. It was the first commercially successful transceiver, replaced AM with SSB and offered a complete 100 watt mobile/desk-top station in a small 16 pound cabinet. Only a few were made because, being immediately popular, it was redesigned and produced for both the amateur and military market as the famous KWM-2 (1958-1978 ?). It was later redesigned as the all solid state KWM-380 (1979-1983). Collins then exited the ham radio market."

On Tuesday November 10 we will have Rob Capon, W3DX, give us a talk on Remote Ham Operations as well as

an overview of Summits on the Air radio communication. And then of course we have our Holiday Social on Tuesday, December 8 at the Elk's Club in Pantops and that will round out the year for programs and presentations.

Please remember however that speakers and topics are needed for the upcoming New Year of 2016 so if you have a topic you would like the club to present at one of its monthly meeting, please let us know. Also, if you would like to give a presentation on any topic related to ham radio, we are happy to give you that opportunity. We try to give a range of topics that will appeal to a wide range of interests but without your input, the choices become limited. **So please help us to help you stay interested.**





The antennas at the Trump (Marshall Manor) repeater site were replaced with new Hustler G6-2/70 units. So far, everything looks fine and I believe the 146.760 repeater is operating very well. In order to be very cautious, I'm not turning the outgoing tone back on for a week or more just to get a feel for how it sounds without it in different situations and times of the day. The new arrangement has both antennas in the same vertical

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plane as the old 2 meter only unit, so coverage should be very similar to what we had before. Having both antennas as dual band units gives us tons of options for duplexing, or splitting the receive and transmit functions. We'll probably be experimenting with those options a bit as time goes on, and as we learn how well they are working now. Many thanks to Benny Peterson of BP towers for a great job with the replacement project, and to Ed Berkowitz and Dave Damon for helping with the swap.

They are aptly named "Boat Anchors" since the 101 weighs ~ 70 lbs and the Viking ~ 85 Ibs! They work great and enjoying working AM on 40 and 80M. So K9MBQ has three complete

The club's annual picnic/silent auction is scheduled for Sunday, September 20, in the pavilion at Darden Towe Park.

<u>New Business --</u> Having a mini Field Day at the Boy Scouts Apple Harvest scheduled for October 20th has been recommended and Ed said he would follow up on that. <u>Old Business -</u> None brought up.

A summary of our Board Retreat By Ed Berkowitz N3US

On August 8, the Board of the AARC met to conduct a Board Retreat. The purpose of this off-site meeting was for the leadership team to brainstorm and discuss possible future activities for our Club.

The board met in the Northside Library, conference room 4, at 10 a.m. – noon

Attendees: Ed Berkowitz, N3US; Larry Eicher, K4JZQ; Jim Owen, K4CGY; AJ Miller, KE4AJM; Don Eason, N4UVA; JimWilson, K4BAV

1. Wrap-up of Field Day 2015 and recommendations for next year's Field Day.

Overall, the Board members were satisfied with this year's FD location at the Emergency Communications Center. Recommendations for next year include: better separation of

antennas; not using Icom rigs, due to their phase noise; having a barbeque with setting up our grills in the field where the large truck was parked this year; considering reimbursement of a club member to provide a slow cooked pork butt; and inviting some smaller, surrounding clubs, such as UVA, to join us for Field Day 2016.

2. Club Equipment Custodian.

Ed pitched the need for a Club Equipment Custodian to keep accurate records of the location of club-owned equipment. The Board members concurred but also requested that Ed convert the current Word listing of equipment to a spreadsheet. Also, the Board members requested that club documents, such as Proclamations, SSA certificates, etc be scanned and posted to the Club website.

3. Rehost Club Webpage from Drupal to Word Press.

Based upon discussions with Mike McPherson and Kenneth Kang, Ed would like to migrate our webpage from Drupal to Word Press as the underlying hosting language.

Word Press is more appropriate for our type of site and will make it easier to manage and modify our webpage content. The cost will be between zero and \$50. The group concurred.

4. Annual Holiday Party and Awards Banquet.

AJ has reserved the Elks Club for our Holiday Party on December 8 and anticipates keeping the cost per person at \$25. AJ, the chairperson for this event, will probably provide raffle prizes similar to last year's, which were Baofeng HTs purchased from Amazon and some of the better, small accessories in the Club's inventory of raffle items. Ed has scheduled this event on the Club Calendar.

5. Improving club member participation in Public Service Events.

Most likely, participation is dropping off due to the aging of the membership. Accordingly, all the Board officers must really "talk-up" the importance of members'

participating in events. In addition, we must attract new, younger hams, as discussed below.

6. Marketing the Club to attract new members, including new and existing hams.

Jim Wilson stated that the local CERT organization typically markets itself at monthly health fairs, farmers markets, etc. Jim will research upcoming events for the Club to set up a booth. AJ will research compiling an email list of local hams, using the FCC database. This would be used for targeted recruiting emails that invite hams to join AARC and will include a link to the Beacon. Larry will pursue placing more announcements about the Club, including VE sessions, on various community online bulletin boards and also recruiting Boy Scouts to become hams. Don Eason proposed that we consider sponsoring a hamfest held indoors at the Earlysville Volunteer Fire Department, with the FD running the food concession. Don will explore a club sponsored hamfest and will ask K4DU to assist him.
