AARC Meeting Minutes 9/8/2020

John Porter reported on Silent Auction:

Presentation by Bill Olesky on MARS:

Bill invited Paul English to give presentation on Army MARS.

Bill first talked about history of MARS (U.S. ARMY Military Auxiliary Radio System). Its purpose is to act as a contingency HF Operational Support to the Dep't of Defense. Also, to provide support services for a complex civil catastrophe and for defense against cyber attacks.

Pre-history before 1920 include wired, spark and then early radio. Used mostly by the Navy. Army used it during gold rush.

1910-15: wireless management done by Government and amateur radio.

Eventually, Federal gov't allocated frequencies and the ARRL setup a Volunteer Radio Corps. During World War I, 4000 hams volunteered to serve in the armed forces. The Navy was given control of all wireless operations until 1919 when Congress gave it over to civilian control.

Post-WWI Signal corps instituted. Volunteers in all 48 states recruited for mobilization and emergencies. Hams lead radio development by experimenting with new technologies. First commercial radio station was KDKA in Pittsburgh.

1920-30: rapid growth in commercial radio. War department linked to ARRL relay system. AMARS was established in the '20s.

1930-50: FCC established. Evolution of mode of choice from spark to CW to AM to SSB. Start of WWII caused ham radio shutdown, 25,000 hams in military. There were 2000 recruited to civil defense.

1950-2000: Value of hams to military operations and service member morale was shown. MARS reorganized into Army and Air Force. MARSgrams and phone patches provide free service to armed forces during Korean, Vietnam and Gulf Wars. 47 MARS stations in Vietnam handled 42,000 messages per month.

AMARS members were patriotic, dedicated, adaptable and innovative volunteers. They had to have General class or higher licenses, be technically skilled and able to follow and provide leadership.

Paul English WD8DBY presentation on AMARS:

Paul is chief of Department of Army MARS.

AMARS mission is to:

- provide contingency HF communications to support DoD and service members
- provide international humanitarian assistance and disaster relief to US combatant commands.
- provide contingency comm's for Defense Support to Civil Authorities.

AMARS is HF radio network and specially trained volunteer operators. It supports national command authority.

Paul reviewed diagram of Global HF Enterprise Network and Authorities.

AMARS interfaces with ARES and RACES. National level has liaison to state and local levels. AMARS supports various activities, e.g. QRPX low power HF competition. DOD COMEX 2020 and ARRL simulated emergency test and Canadian International HF competition.

DoD has time-slot on WWV/WWVH. 10 and 50 minutes after hour. See www.dodmars.org for details. They operate on 5 MHz, 60 M channels. There are 5 frequencies where hams and Federal agencies can interoperate under FCC section 9 7.111 which authorizes this communication. Frequencies 5330.5, 5346.5, 5357.0 5371.5 and 5403.5.

Gov't is primary on 60 meters and Hams secondary.

Some activities with AMARS: QRPX was in March '20 and 144 stations participated.

MARS members bring own gear, expertise and time. Harris radios used in DoD.
