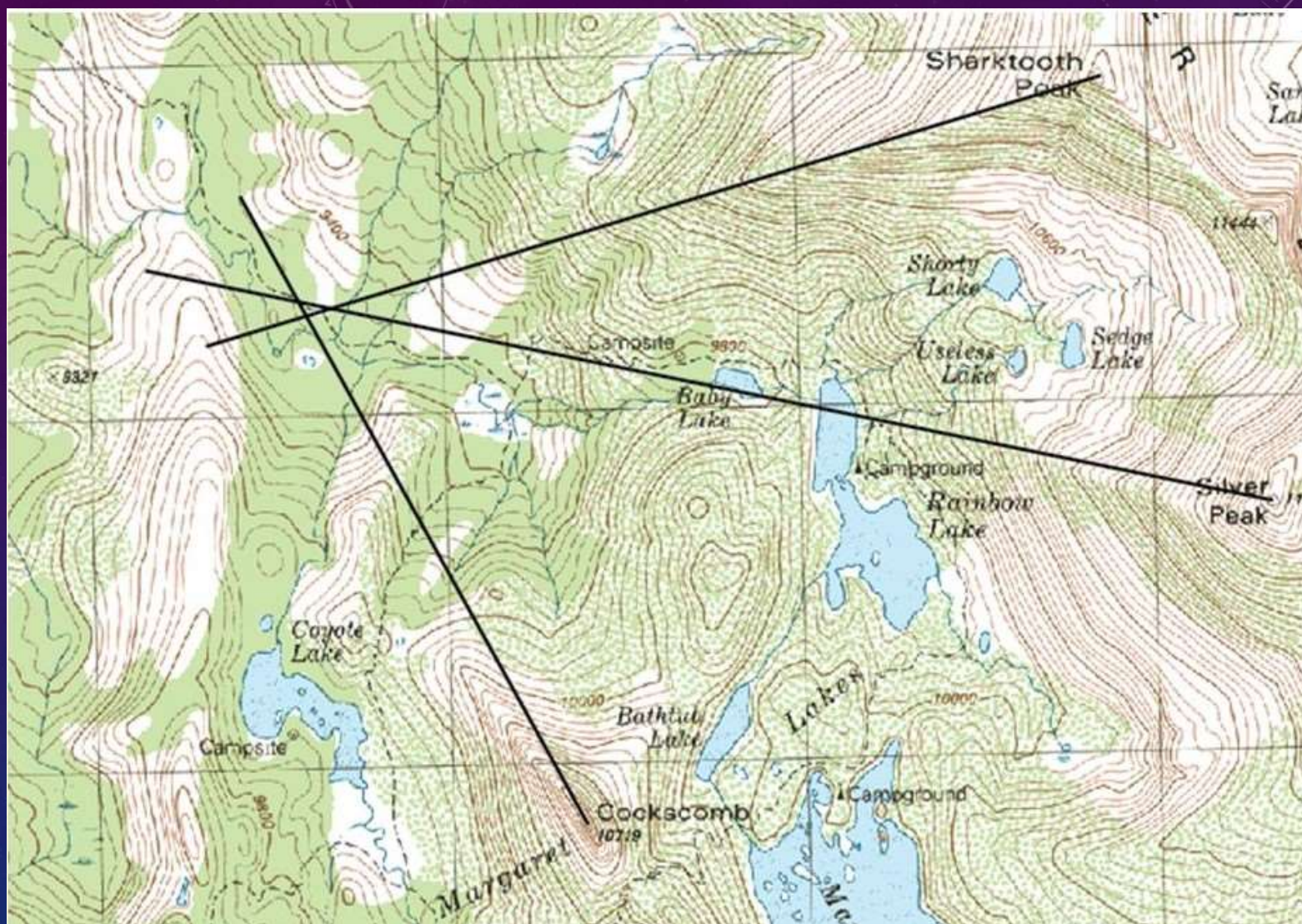

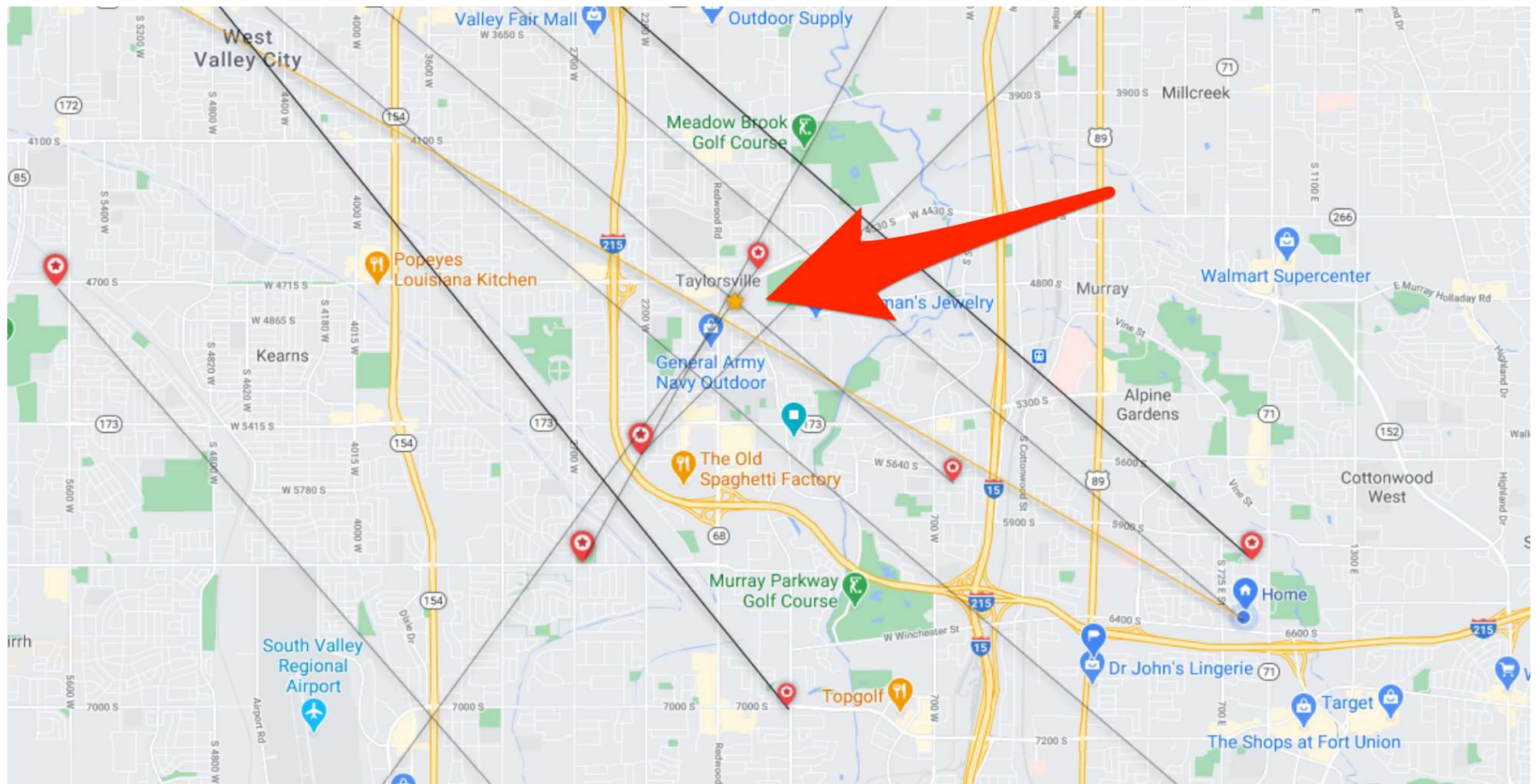

WHAT IS FOX HUNTING?

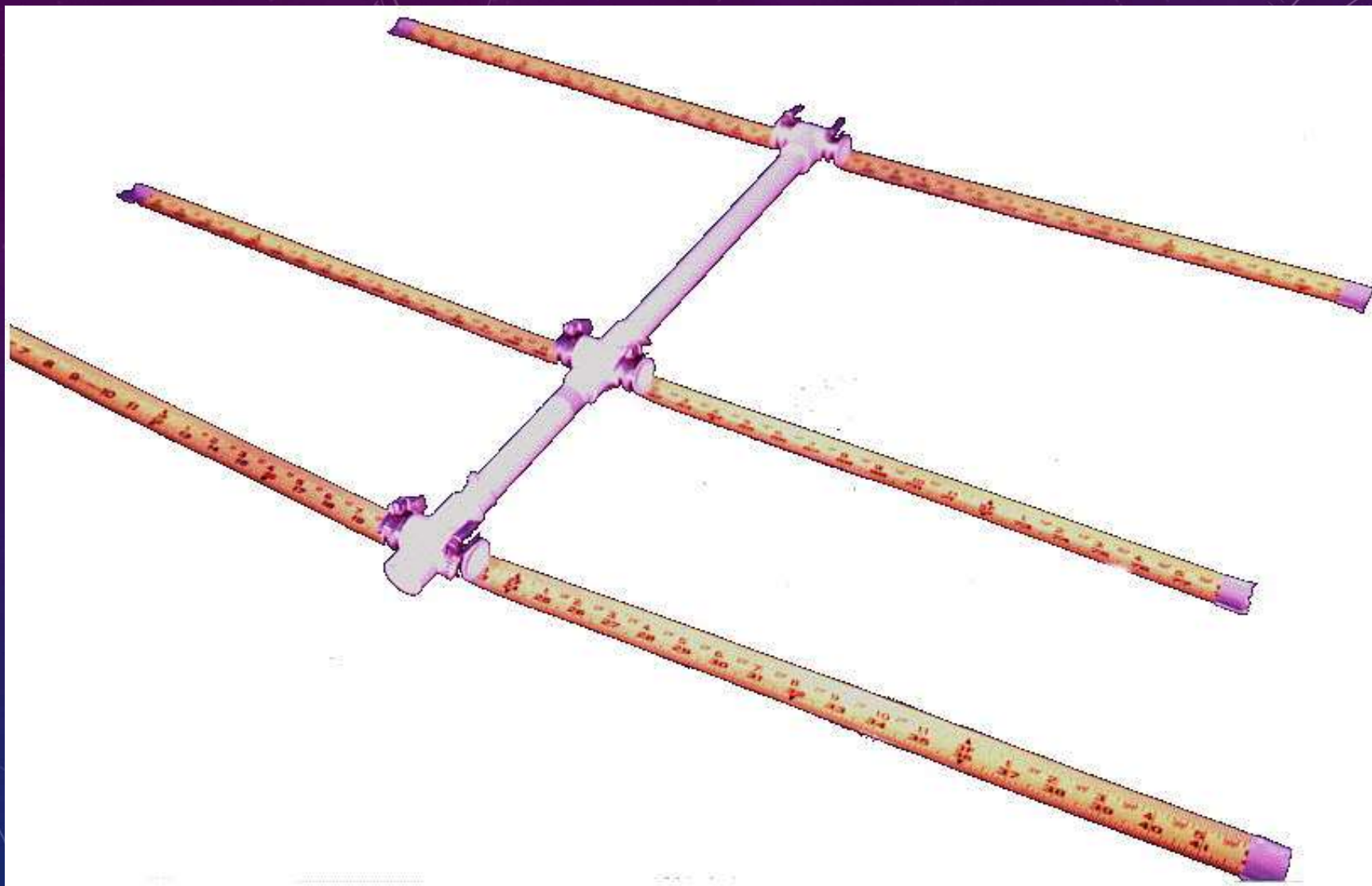
Use radio direction-finding and orienteering techniques to find a source of RF emissions, such as a hidden transmitter, jammer, or RFI source.

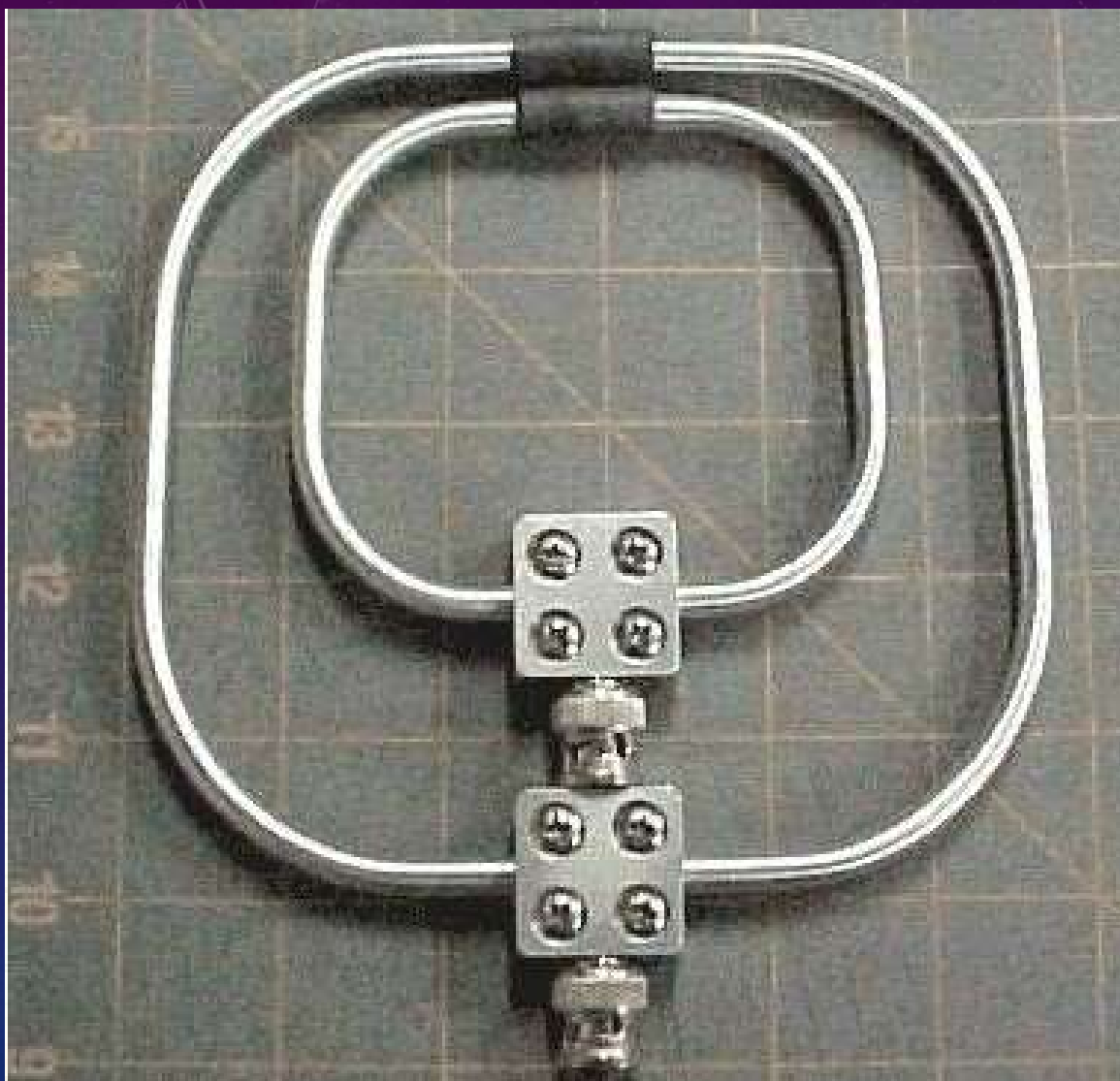




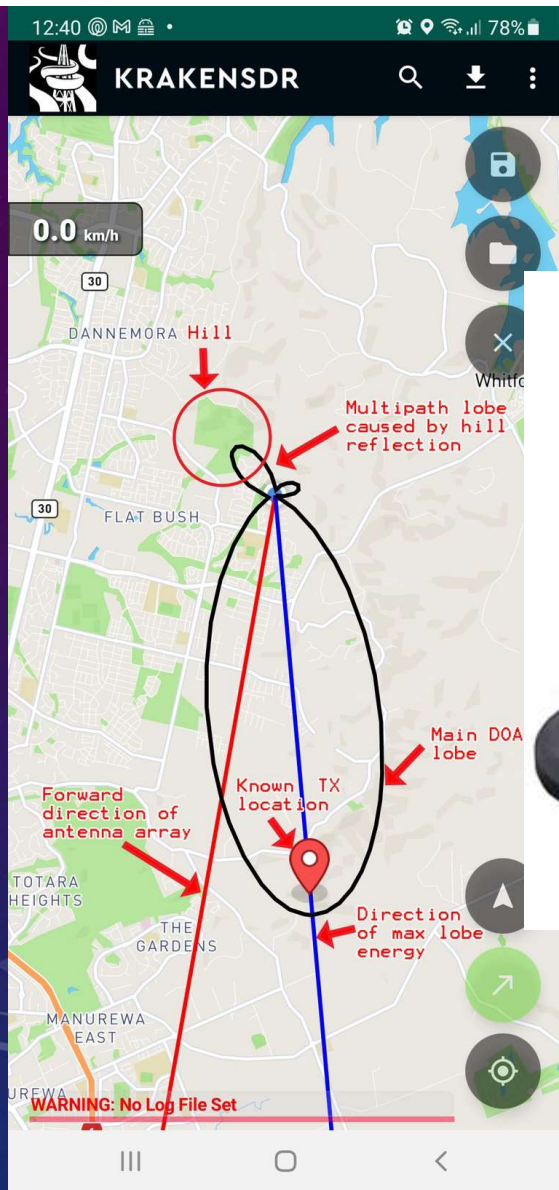

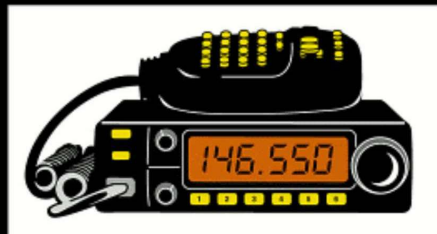

NIMS and ICS

- The Incident Command System (ICS) was developed in the 1970's to coordinate wildfire fighting efforts in California.
- The National Incident Management System (NIMS) was created in the wake of 9/11 to generalize and extend ICS for any incident anywhere.
- Public safety and emergency management agencies are required to implement NIMS/ICS to be eligible for federal funding...
 - So virtually everyone operates under NIMS/ICS

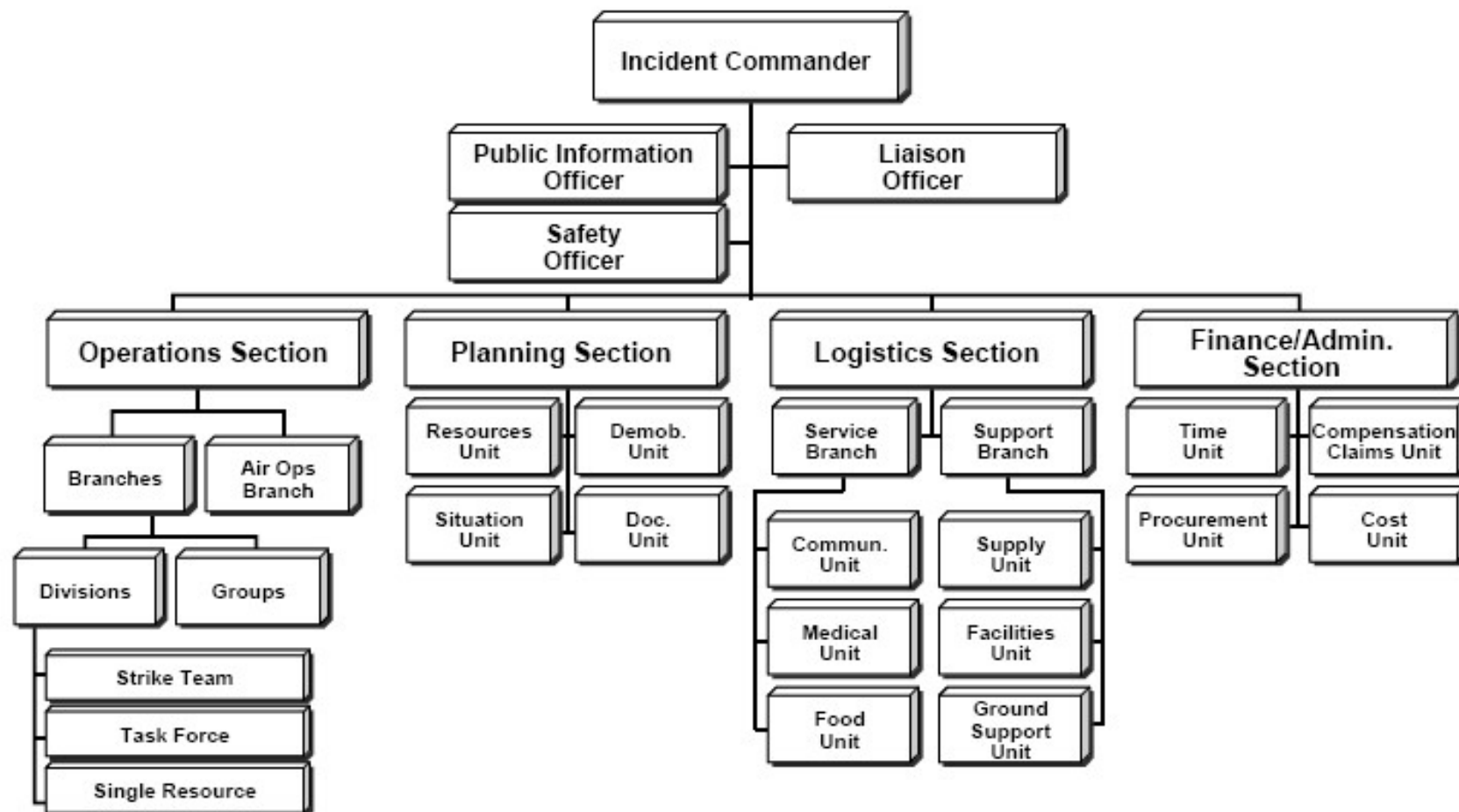

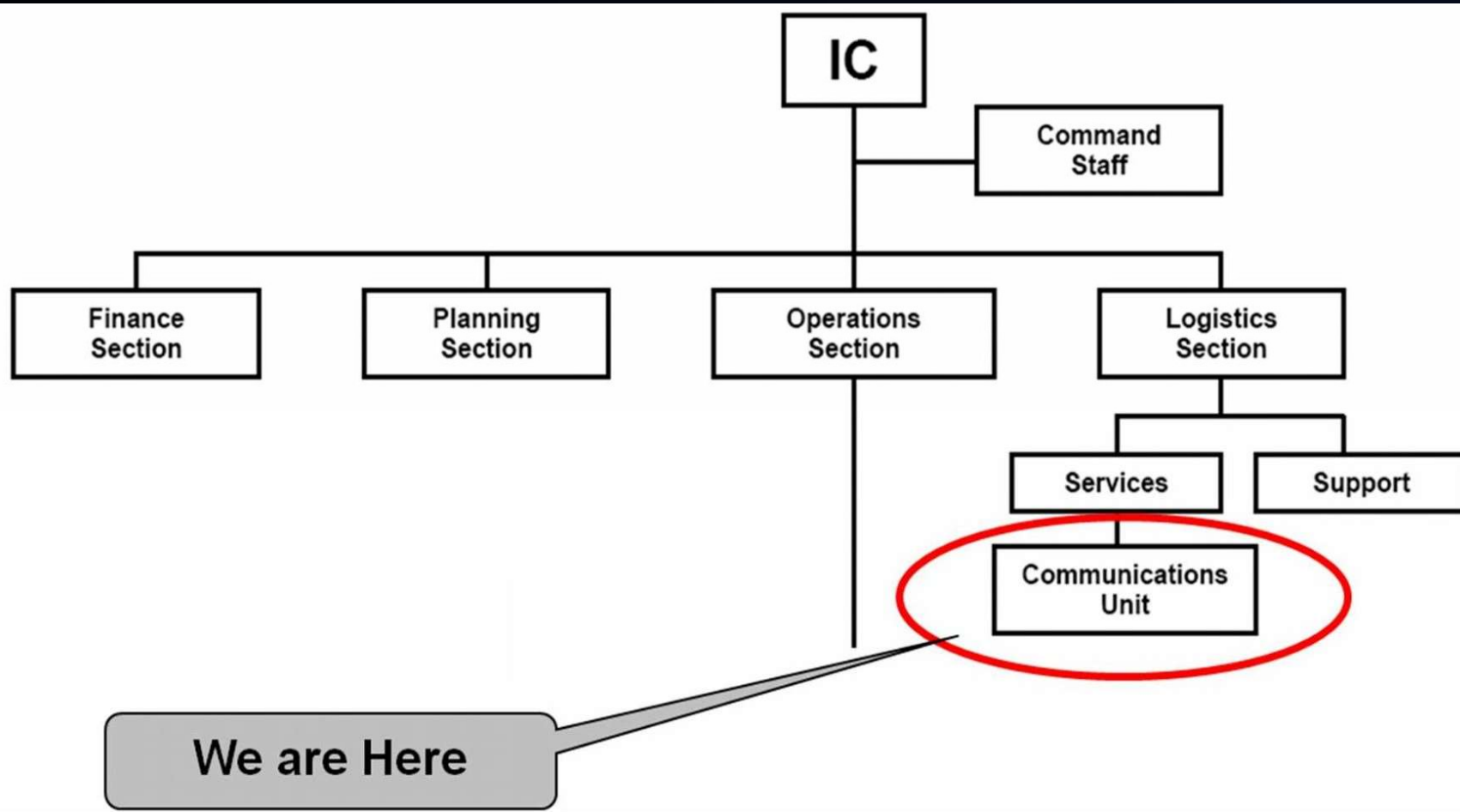

Incident Command System (ICS) Structure



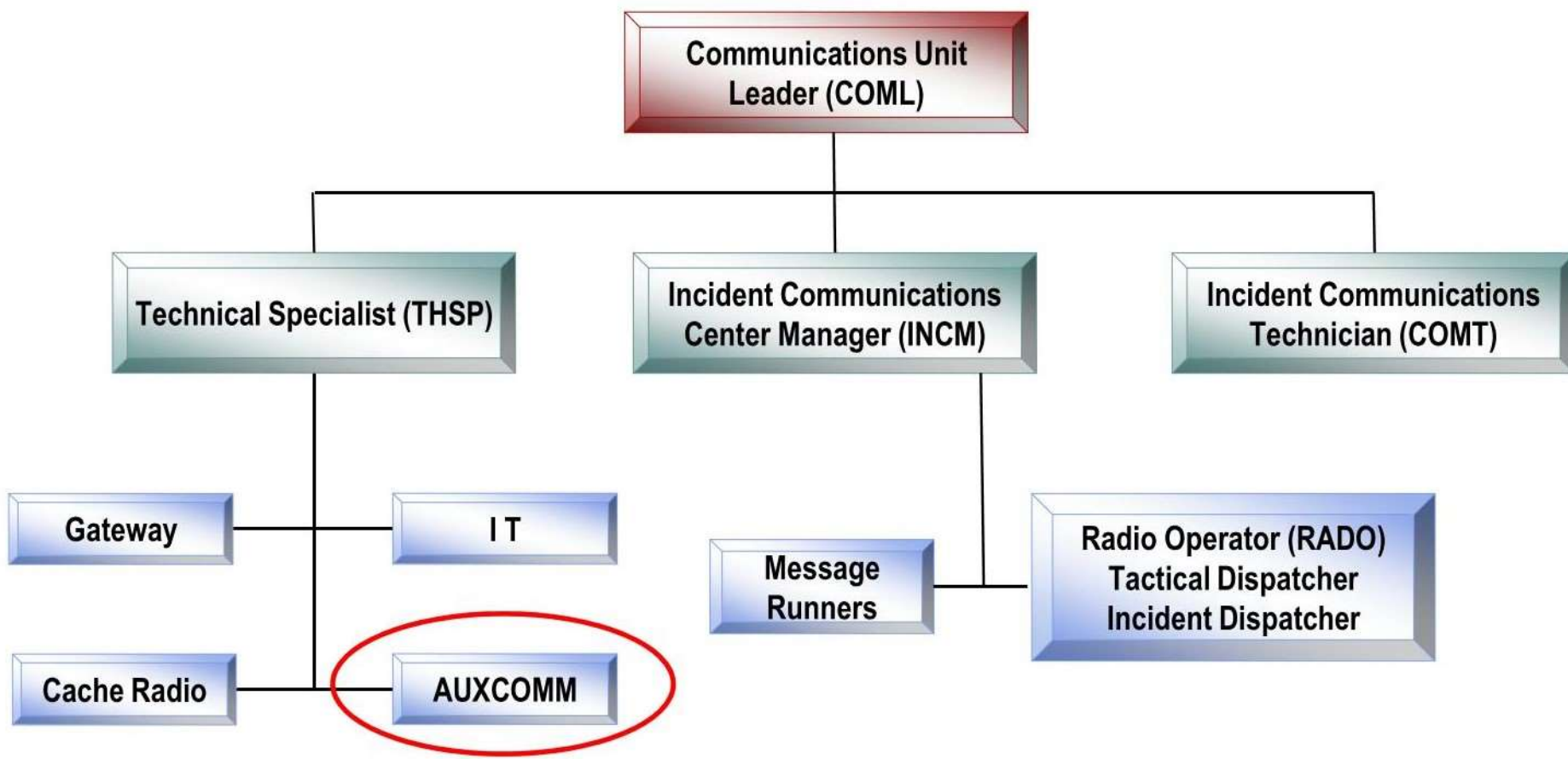
Incident Command System (ICS) Structure
